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FORT ROCK

Tuesday afternoon, April 6, about 55 persons gathered at the Fort Rock Grange Hall for the meeting of the subcommittee of the Land Use Committee of Lake County.

Members of the committee present were Raymond Johnson, chairman, Land Use Committee; Ed Bailey, Bureau of Land Management representative; C. W. Ogilvie, county court; Elgin Cornett, county agent; Wayne Crane, Soil Conservation Service representative; E. R. Jackman, range specialist; Dan Schumacher, Silver Lake rancher; Phil Smith, water master; Roy Perry, Lakeview rancher; Marvin Shearer, irrigation specialist, OSC; Fred Bubbe, FHA representative; Dr. Grant E. Blanch, professor of economics.

The topics discussed were the economics of irrigated farming, methods used for irrigation, capacity of wells and pumps, cost of crops and yields and possibilities of crop rotations.

The meeting was held in connection with REA studies for this area.

It has been pointed out that power would help this valley economically as well as raise the living standards of many here. The area has been improving in the past several years but without power the farmer and rancher are hindered from going ahead with irrigation projects.

Many ranchers and farmers are curtailing irrigation plans for this year and putting in dry land crops as they do not wish to invest heavily in diesel or gas power and then have to invest in electrical equipment if power does get here.

Different reports and estimates show that electricity for power will be cheaper than any other type for operation and maintenance.

Prior to the meeting dinner was served by women of the Fort Rock Grange.

Lynn S. Ludlow, chief of the agricultural section of Washington, D. C., arrived here March 31, compiling figures to help process the REA loan for power. The following day he conferred in Burns with Elgin Cornett, Lake County agent. On April 2 he conferred in Bend with the SCS and left by plane for Washington at 12:45 that night.
