

McCall Being Considered At Grant

Definite Action Awaited

Klamath Union High School's head basketball coach, Paul McCall is definitely being considered for the same job at Grant High in Portland, according to Portland officials and McCall.

Despite rumors in local sport circles that McCall has already been signed as the head basketball coach in the Portland school, nothing definite has been done.

In a long distance phone conversation with both the Portland officials and the Pelican hoop coach it was stated that no official steps have been taken yet, but that it is almost certain that the signing will take place sometime this next week.

McCall told the Herald and News that he would accept the contract if it was offered to him.

Since coming to Klamath Falls in 1947 as assistant basketball coach under Wayne Scott, who has since moved to a Pendleton coaching assignment, McCall has made a great number of friends and he expressed last night that he will regret leaving Klamath, but for the betterment of his family and himself, if offered, he will have to accept the position.

McCall took over the head coaching job from Scott in 1948 and has held the position since. Over the six year period he has won the Southern Oregon Conference three times, and in 1950-51 his squad took second place in the state high school playoffs.

Besides basketball he has assisted in football as a backfield coach, and has guided the high school tennis team.

The likeable hoop coach graduated from Bradley University where he compiled a sensational record as an athlete. He played three years of varsity basketball and was named to almost all the All-American teams his senior year.

McCall also played football and track while at Bradley and was named to the Little All-American football team during this time.

The record that he has compiled at KUHS is outstanding. During the period of six years McCall teams have won 114 games while dropping 39. Included in his records is a tie ball game with Redding in 1950-51 season.

Several of his ballplayers have made the grade in college basketball. Bill Toole and Ralph Carroll of Oregon State and Ray Bell at Oregon. Tom Schubert and Jerry Overen have shown up well at Oregon Tech.

Portland Whips Hollywood

Still at the bottom of the pile in the Pacific Coast League Saturday without a victory to their credit are the Hollywood Stars, champions of the circuit for the last two years.

Portland beat them again Friday night, 9-8, for the fourth straight time, or possibly it should be said that the Stars beat themselves again. Without detracting anything from the Ports, who have played heads-up baseball and shown a tight inner defense, it is patently obvious that Hollywood's infield leaves much to be desired.

BLEW

The Stars blew their game in the sixth inning. Jack Lohrke, stepping in at short for the first time, muffed a double play ball that would have retired the side without a score. After that the Ports went on to score seven runs.

Fielding lapses and slow base running by another shortstop, George Wopinek cost the Stars two other games, and Wopinek now is ticketed for New Orleans.

Hollywood had a 4-0 lead through the fifth and Red Mungler had shackled the Beavers. At that point, Portland had failed to hit and had only two men on the bases, both from walks.

But in the Portland sixth, four hits and three runs put Mungler out. Then came Bill MacDonald and the Beavers took him for three hits with Don Eggert's homer bringing in three runs.

Bill Bottler pitched the sixth and part of the seventh for Portland and was in trouble all the time. Two more Portland pitchers, Al Porto and Lee Anthony, also had their hands full until high fly to Grandy Gladstone in the ninth, with one run in and the tying run on, ended the game.

Four hits by outfielder Jack Faber, one of them a home run, paced San Diego to an 8-5 victory over Los Angeles. The Angels drove rookie John Tomonovsky off the hill in the second and had a 4-0 lead in the fourth until the Padres began to solve Bobby Spicer, and two home runs got them back in the ball game. A four-run assault in the eighth clinched the victory. Dick Sleser connected for one of the Padre homers and Fred Richards hit one for the Angels.

EVENED

Sacramento evened its series with Oakland by taking a 4-1 decision. The wildness of Oakland pitchers contributed to their downfall. Don Ferrarese, young Oak lefty, had allowed the Sacs only two hits, one of them a homer in the fourth inning by Tommy Glaviano, until he blew sky high in the ninth. Bob Dillinger singled and was sacrificed by Hank Schenz. Glaviano then singled home Dillinger, whereupon Ferrarese retired Nippy Jones and then walked the next three batters, forcing in Glaviano. Don Murphy came on to relieve and hit Richie Myers, forcing in another run.

Seattle and San Francisco battled for 15 innings before the Rainiers won it, 10-5, by virtue of a five-run spurge in the 15th, in which Al Zarilla homered with a mate aboard. It was Seattle's fourth straight over the Sacs. It was tied 3-3 in the fourth. San Francisco went ahead 5-3 in the fifth but Seattle tied it 5-5 in the eighth, leading to the long overtime.

"If they'd ever taken pictures of Tommy's curve there wouldn't be any of that silly argument about whether a ball breaks," Birdie said positively. "Once I got sore at him for shaking off my signs and I went out to him and said 'okay, wise guy, you know so much, throw anything you want to and I'll catch it. You won't get any more signs from me today.'"

"We went along all right for an inning or so, and then there came a spot that was perfect for a fast ball. I was set for it, all right, but it wasn't a fast ball. It broke down and hit my foot and nearly killed me. I was dancing around and Tommy hollered 'all right, Birdie, now give up? I spent six pitches setting that one up for you.' I never tried that on him again."

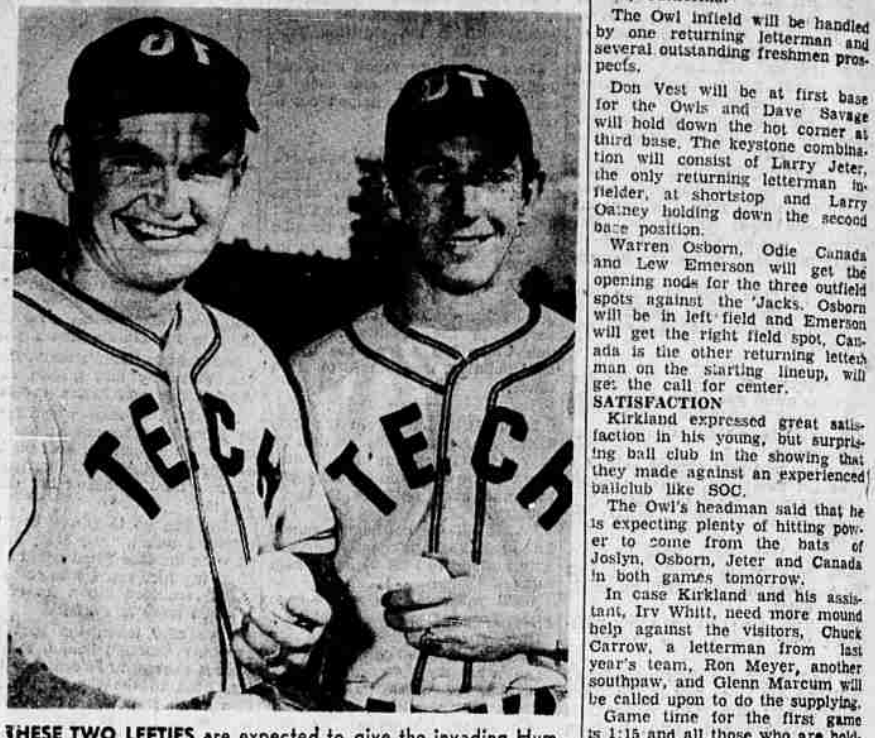
SATISFACTION
