Victim Of Horse Kick Recovering

LAKEVIEW - Richard Emery, who suffered a fractured leg when kicked by a horse April 5 at the old Fred Hanson ranch on the Westside, was reported doing well at Lakeview Public Hospital.

The attending physician said Emery, who is a son-in-law of Ralph Renner, suffered greatly from shock and exposure. He was injured about 3 p.m. and was found by his brother-in-law, Tony Weber, about 6:30 p.m. During that time, he sat in the wet field, his right femur fractured, suffering the intense cold from wind, rain and snow. Members of the disaster crew reported that Emery was rescuing a calf from a bog. He had dismounted from his horse, and a thistle blew in front of the horse, startling the animal and causing it to kick. It was reported that Emery had applied a tourniquet to the leg to control bleeding, and had strapped his legs together in an effort to apply traction to the broken bone. The disaster crew and doctor met Weber and Renner bringing Emery from the field in a pickup, and brought the injured man on into Lakeview. Members of the disaster crew were Delmer McGrath, George Ironmenger and Bob Howard.

Bail has been set at \$5000. Duke, it is reported, will fight extradition. Duke is charged with taking the six children after separating from his wife, Jean, of Klamath Falls.

Graft Charges Rock Japan

TOKYO - Police Saturday arrested the treasurer of Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida's liberal Party and presidents of Japan's foremost shipping and shipbuilding companies on suspicion of being involved in the biggest shipping scandal in Japanese history. Those arrested were Akio Hashimoto, Liberal Party treasurer; Kanoo Niwa, president of the Mitsubishi Dockyard Co.; and Yasuzo Ichii, president of the Mitsui Shipping Co. Three Diet members - one Liberal and one Progressive - are already under arrest in connection with the shipping scandals. Prosecutors have asked the diet to waive immunity for arrest of three more Liberal lawmakers. The government officials are accused of accepting bribes and lush parties from shipping companies in return for subsidies and other favors.
