

Iranian Oil Talks Stated

LONDON (AP) — Britain announced Saturday a mission representing eight Western oil companies will leave immediately for Tehran to open negotiations for the restarting of the billion dollar Iranian oil industry.

A Foreign Office spokesman told a news conference the oil companies, including five American firms, have reached agreement on a plan to resume operations of the oil fields, which were closed after Iran nationalized the British-owned industry three years ago.

The spokesman said the mission would leave Saturday night by air for the Iranian capital on the "warm invitation of the Zahedi government."

First National Statement Published

Quarterly statement of condition of First National Bank of Portland, said that figures for the three branches of First National Bank of Portland located in the area were reported today by the branch managers.

In releasing the figures, the bank president reported that over March 31, 1963 deposits at First National have increased \$125,925,561, loans have increased \$50,208,830, and resources have increased \$136,539,704. Capital funds on March 31, 1964 were \$44,275,764, which amount will be increased by \$16 million on about April 15 when sale of an additional 400,000 shares of stock is completed.

The transfer of the 18 affiliated banking offices to First National branches was effected on February 8.

Papers Purchase Newsprint Plant

PORTLAND (AP) — Full ownership of the Publishers Paper Co. newsprint plant at Oregon City now is held by the Los Angeles Times, the Los Angeles Mirror and the Salt Lake City Desert News.

The newspapers, which already owned most of the stock, bought the remaining 24.5 per cent from Oregon Pulp and Paper Co. and Columbia River Paper Mills, Sam J. Robinson, general manager of Publishers, reported Friday.

The price was not announced. The Times-Mirror holds 67.55 per cent and the Desert News owns 32.45 per cent.

French Eye Dulles Visit

PARIS (AP) — Several French newspapers Saturday took a dim view of Secretary of State Dulles' trip to Europe this weekend to try to work out a joint warning to Communist China against aggression in Southeast Asia.

The leftist but anti-Communist Paris newspaper Combat said British and French statesmen were being tactically silent on Dulles' trip because they felt such a declaration might ruin the West's chances to "explore the depths" of Russia's intentions at the conference opening April 20 at Geneva on Korea and Indochina.

The conservative Voix du Nord of the northern industrial city of Lille opposed Dulles' call for an anti-Red stand in an editorial under the heading "We must say no."

Oregon Barristers Mark Move Of Judge Fee To Federal Court Duties

PORTLAND — Judge James A. Fee, nominated as a Ninth Federal Circuit Court judge, in legal circles is best known, perhaps, for his wide knowledge of the law.

His love for the law and his love for studying it — his prodigious memory and great capacity for work are legendary — will hear him in good stead on the appeals bench where study is the principal activity of judges.

One of his aides tells of coming upon the judge in his office one night with four law books open before him. They were on easels. Judge Fee, on his feet, was going first from one, then to the other, studying them simultaneously in researching a case.

It is with mixed emotions that Oregon lawyers will see Judge Fee leave. They growl at the dictator fashion in which he runs his court. Yet they would rather submit a tough case to him than to almost any other judge because they know the decision will stand up.

A big man of 6 feet 2 inches, who played football in college and was an aviator in World War I, Judge Fee is "the nicest man you'd ever know off the bench," according to the often heard remark from attorneys who a few moments before might have been the target of his wrath from the bench.

Government attorneys — Democratic or Republican — get the same treatment as private lawyers. Washington bureaucrats who never have heard of Judge Fee can't understand telegrams from U. S. attorneys in Oregon explaining things that can't be done.

When an executive order from Washington arbitrarily stated the temperature should be at a certain level in all federal buildings, Judge Fee countermanded with an order to the building superintendent that his court room temperature be set higher. Judge Fee won over Washington. And the workers in the building applauded it as a victory for the basic separation of powers between executive and judicial.

Judge Fee hates dilatory tactics and will not permit attorneys to drag their feet.

There's never any doubt who's in charge of the courtroom when Judge Fee is on the bench.

Stories of his strict adherence to protocol are legion. Once a Journal reporter, Jack Ostergren, peeked through the door, merely to see if court were in session.

It was and Judge Fee saw him. He halted proceedings and sent his crier (bailiff) to get Ostergren. The reporter, led through the courtroom and seated at the press table, was reminded by the judge that was the space reserved for the press.

Off the bench he is gracious, and, when talking with friends, sprinkles his conversation with the earthiest of terms. And he is well aware of his reputation.

This reporter, excusing a delay in getting to him some prints of news pictures he had requested, explained that the photographer was something of a prima donna and please be patient.

"Prima donna?" said the judge, drawing himself up and tapping his chest. "I know something about prima donnas myself!"

Before his nomination was sent to the Senate, Judge Fee was investigated by the FBI.

Was that necessary for a person with Judge Fee's reputation who has been a federal district judge nearly a quarter of a century?

"I think it's a good thing," said the judge. "Better to find out now than later if something's wrong."

In Oregon, Oscar Haag, extension dairy marketing specialist, says an intensified June Dairy Month promotion this year is now underway with a series of planning meetings scheduled through April and May in 25 Oregon cities.
