## Marine Recruiter Clears Up Military Service Laws

Since the security of this country requires military manpower, the Congress of the United States has passed military service laws which vitally affect every young man who has joined one of the Armed Services since June 19, 1951, or who will be called for service in the future. Staff Sergeant William M. Allen, Marine Corps Recruiter in Klamath Falls said the following facts should help clarify the meaning of these laws.

According to the Selective Service Act of June 19, 1951, a youth becomes available for military service after he reaches his 19th birthday and must register with his local draft board within five days following that birthday. Everyone in good physical and mental condition, unless otherwise deferred for specific reasons by the local draft board, must serve on active duty for a period of at least two years.

The total service required of each youth is eight years, which may be partially fulfilled on active duty with the remainder in a ready or standby reserve status. A man being transferred from active duty to the ready reserve may be recalled to active duty, in the event of national emergency as proclaimed by the President. However, the standby reserve will be called only in the event of national emergency or an all-out war declared by Congress.

ESgt. Allen states that among the advantages of enlisting in a regular component of the Armed Services is the fact that a man can plan his military career to qualify him for an earlier transfer to the standby reserve.

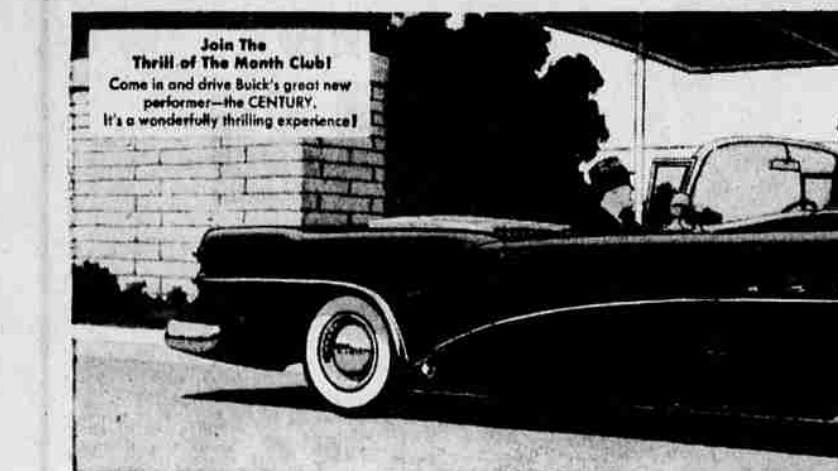
