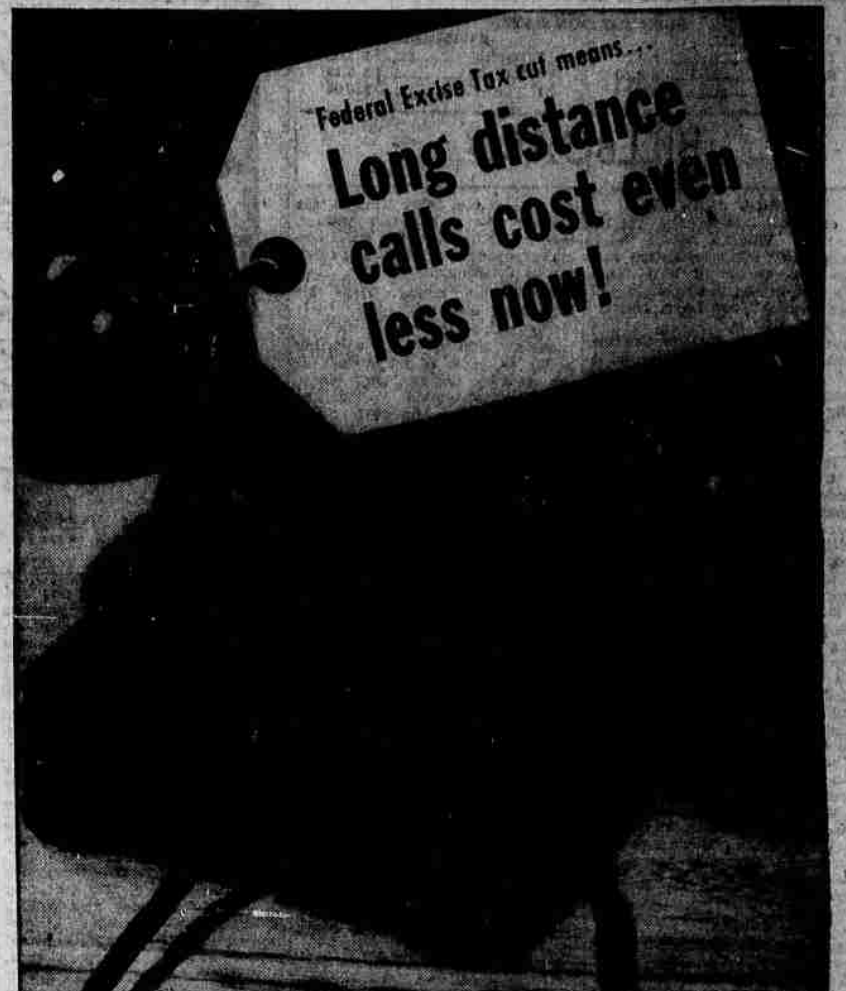
Butte Valley 4-H Club Meets
