Eugene Newspaper Blasted By City Council Members

EUGENE (AP) — The Eugene City Council cut its Monday night meeting short in protest to what its members called improper editorial attacks by the Register-Guard, Eugene daily newspaper.

Council President Calvin Crumbaker said in a prepared statement, "It appears the council should not further conduct the city's business until it shall have a chance to make a complete statement exposing... an editorial attack."

He said it was a "personal vendetta... personal animosity."

The matter stemmed, apparently, from events of early February. At that time the council had under consideration the question of zoning a piece of property. A planning committee had recommended one use, but the council

in an 8-0 vote had taken a differing stand.

A Register-Guard editorial by William Tugman was critical of what it called a secret meeting at the home of the mayor prior to the public meeting at which the zoning matter was decided.

Later, petitions were circulated and the zoning question was referred to the people.

Ray Siegenthaler, council member, wrote a protesting letter to the Register-Guard Monday in which he said the newspaper had questioned integrity of the council members, an action which "I for one can no longer tolerate..."

He said he believed other councilmen felt as he did.

At Monday night's meeting, each councilman and the mayor, V. Edwin Johnson, supported that view.

In an editorial prepared for Tuesday's Register-Guard, Tugman reviewed the matter and said, "Our point has been simply that public matters should always be discussed publicly and in public places."

Bee Thefts Lead To Brand Warning

SALEM (AP) — Bee keepers were advised by the State Agriculture Department Tuesday to register the brands for their spiny equipment.

The warning was given after a series of three thefts in which beekeepers had all their bees stolen. The latest was in Linn County, where 40 hives were stolen in one night.

None of the losers had registered his brand.

Twins "Boobytrap" Cops, Courts, State In Strange Missouri Liquor Law Case

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. (AP) — A few minutes after midnight Dec. 2, 1950, a couple of deputy sheriffs went to St. Joseph, Mo., hotel operated by Ora Goldman. They later testified they bought whisky at the hotel and arrested Ora. He asked them to wait a minute, saying he wanted to give his keys and his money to his brother, Ira.

Ora went alone into another room and—testimony showed later—told his brother to give up to the law.

That's when the confusion really started.

Ira went to the station with the deputies. He said he tried to tell them he was Ira and not Ora but they booked him anyway on a charge of selling liquor without a license.

During the trial of Ora—who was really Ira—Ora's wife testified her husband was home that night and didn't spend any time at all in jail.

Guernsey Herd Purchase Told

PORTLAND (AP) — Rep. A. R. Bush (R-Pa.) has purchased a 125-head herd of Guernsey cattle from an Oregon breeder, it was disclosed here Monday.

A. C. Bush, son of the congressman, negotiated the purchase from M. C. Fleming of Troutdale. Neither party reported the price. However, a somewhat similar 120-head herd sold for \$503,000 in New York last year.

One of the cows sold is Fleming's Ivy Oaks Belle's Jingle, which holds the world record for producing more than 1,000 pounds of butterfat in each of four successive years.

The cattle will be loaded into seven railroad cars Saturday for shipment to Bush's farm at Muncy, Pa. Bush, now serving his second term in Congress, is a transit company operator.

Western Fir Shows Drop

PORTLAND (AP) — The Western Oregon and Washington Douglas fir industry Tuesday reported that the first quarter of 1954 brought a fall-off in all activities.

Compared with the first quarter a year ago, production was down more than 180 million feet, orders were off nearly 35 million and shipments were down 45 million.

However, the West Coast Lumbermen's Assn. reported that while activity was at a slower pace than last year, it was above that of two years ago in the same period and was substantially higher than the 1949-53 average.

The unfilled order file at the end of March was 865 million feet and the inventory was slightly over a billion feet, close to the usual figure for this season.

Lincoln Vice Still Probed

NEWPORT, Ore. (AP) — The corruption-probing grand jury continued Tuesday to check into police and other activities brought into question by allegations of vice and lax law enforcement in Lincoln County's past.

The jury after a week's recess, on Monday showed the course of part of its investigation by hearing from Mrs. Vernon Burroughs, widow of the man who operated the Delake Amusement Co. His 73 slot machines were seized in a February, 1953, raid.

Then the jury heard from a number of police officers and former policemen, as well as from L. G. English, long-time district attorney before election of William Hollen.

Both Hollen and Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton are continuing in aiding the grand jury in its study.

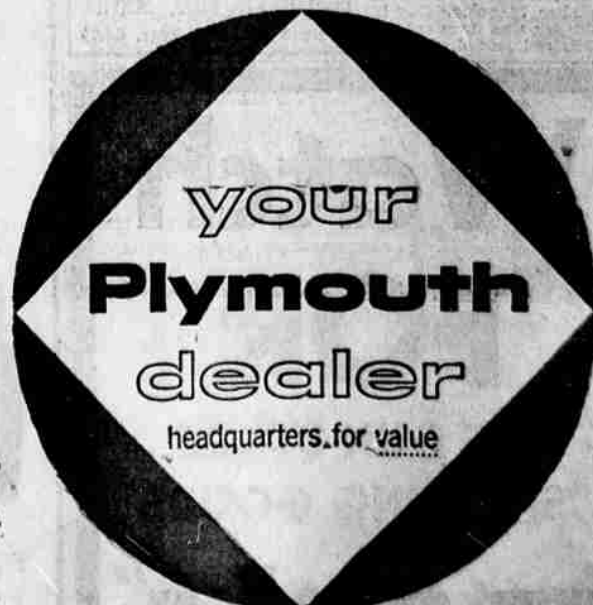
