

Midgets, Grudge Match Highlight Mat Program

It will be the mighty might of the wrestling ring, the midgets and a grudge match, that was started on last week's mat program between Tommy Martindale and Ivan Kameronoff, highlighting tonight's wrestling card at the Armory.

The midgets will be led into town by Sky Low Low, who claims to be the strongest midget wrestler in the country, and his partner of the tag team match, Tiger Jackson.

These two little grapplers will meet another tough pair in Pee Wee James and Tuffy McGraw in the mainline of a standard mat card that promoter Mack Lillard has been trying to arrange for the local wrestling fans the past few weeks.

The last time these little might of dynamite took up action in the Armory ring the house was packed and Lillard thinks that this team of four midgets will do the same thing.

The tag team match between the four little gentlemen of the mat circles will be preceded by two more outstanding matches that should warm up the atmosphere for the main show.

In the opener, George Dusette, the strong French Canadian, will tangle with a newcomer around local circles when he meets Lou Kline in a forty minute bout. Dusette has been showing in the Armory ring the past few weeks and had made quite a name for himself in that time, but Kline is expected to show local fans a few of his own tricks before the night is over.

In the semi-windup of the match of matches will probably take place between Tommy Martindale and Ivan Kameronoff in what looks like a top notch grudge match that was brought around from last week's main event.

In last Wednesday's mainline between Kameronoff and Dusette, Kameronoff was beaten, but it took two to do it. Martindale was acting as referee, and between his own right hands and Dusette's right's he worked the Russian over before the action had finished.

Kameronoff, of course, had asked for the beating he was given when he took it upon himself to use illegal tactics on Dusette and then take a few swings at referee Martindale.

The mad Russian has been looking forward to tonight's match with the popular grappler and is waiting to show local fans that Martindale isn't quite as tough as he made out to be last week.

Martindale on the other hand is expected to do a little proving himself when the semi-windup starts. Martindale, who is very popular with basin wrestling fans, will have to give the Armory patrons something to think about or lose some of his popularity.

Lillard reminds everyone that with the reduction in price because of the federal excise tax cut and another cut made by the local boxing and wrestling commission it will be easier on the pocketbooks for local fans. Between the top flight card and the new low prices Lillard is expecting a capacity crowd for tonight's program.

Shantz Wins Game; Could Be Last One

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Bobby Shantz won a ball game yesterday but he's wondering today if it was his last.

The 23-year-old southpaw had to leave the game because of a muscle spasm in his valuable pitching arm.

The Athletics were leading 5-2 as Shantz pitched to Boston's Billy Goodman in the top of the sixth inning. The little lefty broke a beautiful curve ball across Goodman's letters. The crowd of 16,331 cheered. But out on the mound, Shantz was doubled over.

CONFERRED

He motioned to the dugout and Manager Eddie Joost came running out. They conferred a few seconds and Shantz, his head bowed and the picture of dejection, slowly walked to the dressing room, where trainer Jim Tadley went to work on him.

Shantz, who had his back operated on in his rookie season with the club, fractured a wrist at the height of his fabulous 1952 season, when he won 24 games and was selected the league's Most Valuable Player, and injured his arm last season, was almost in tears.

ALIMENT

He was sidelined most of last year by the arm ailment suffered in Boston May 21. He went to see Dr. Charles Van Ronk, a retired Philadelphia physician who in the past has helped quite a few baseball players with arm trouble. The doctor gave him his special treatment and pronounced him fit to work again. He looked good in the early innings against the Red Sox, working with that smooth, effortless motion so familiar to the Philadelphia faithful.

MONTREAL (AP) — The Montreal Canadiens—old hands at coming from behind—were back in the National Hockey League championship picture after winning the sixth game of the best-of-seven final series with the Detroit Red Wings.

The Canadiens, who have won the last two Stanley Cups, squared the series at 3-3 Tuesday night by trouncing the Red Wings 4-1. The final game for the cup will be played at Detroit Friday night.

The teams battled through a scoreless first period and at 12:07 of the second Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion drove home a 25-foot shot past Terry Sawchuk to give the Canadiens a 1-0 lead.

One minute later Floyd Curry scored his first goal and 78 seconds after that he fired a 10-footer past the surprised Sawchuk.

Detroit, winner of six straight regular season titles, cut the Montreal margin to two goals in the final period as Metro Prystai scored unassisted. Maurice (The Rocket) Richard closed out the Montreal scoring at the 10-minute mark after taking a pass from Elmer Lach.

The Rainiers, opening a seven-game stand at Sacramento, bowed 6-5 as the Solons hopped on Seattle hurlers for six runs in the last two innings.

Bud Sheely, who worked behind the plate for the Rainiers before he went up to the Chicago White Sox, drove in three of the runs with an eighth inning single. Then Sacramento sent in Grumpy Guy Fletcher, another former Seattleite, who held the Suds in check for the last two frames.

The Portland Beavers, tied with Seattle atop PCL standings, also dropped their second game of the season.

San Diego stopped the onrushing Beavers, 4-2, behind Bill Thomas's three-hit pitching. George Lerchen's stickwork was responsible for both Portland runs. He batted in Frankie Austin in the first with a single and socked a homer in the third. The Padres collected eight hits off Red Adams and Lee Anthony. in and filled the bases and was yanked in favor of Adrian Zabel, who got the side out after a fly scored one.

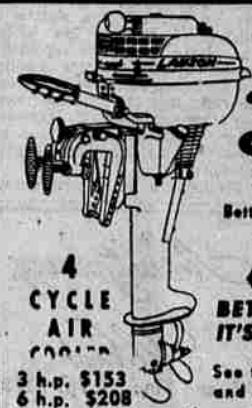
