Disputed Decisions Fill Armory Program

Action and excitement was free for the asking in last night's wrestling program when the midge and a grudge match between Tommy Martindale and Ivan Kamenoff had finished.

Sky Low Low and Tiger Jackson won a disputed decision over Tuffy McCrea and Pee Wee James, and the crowd let John Paul Henning, the referee, know about it. Henning was busy seeing that McCrea would stay outside the ropes until tagged by James, and in doing so, Sky Low Low and Jackson would take turns punishing James with illegal tactics while Henning's back was turned. Twice, Sky Low Low climbed to the top rope and Jackson would maneuver James into position and the little grappler would jump from the ropes and strike James in the head.

The first fall went to the Low Low-Jackson team, then McCrea and James combined with the help of Jackson to win the second fall. Low Low was held in James' full nelson and Jackson took a swing at his opponent only to strike his tag team partner. From then on it was McCrea's and James' fall.

The final fall saw Low Low and McCrea use the ropes for leverage and collide in the center of the ring, knocking each other out. While Henning was putting McCrea outside the ring, Jackson climbed in and pulled Low Low across McCrea, and Henning turned around to count McCrea out for the third and deciding fall.

The semi-windup gave the fans plenty of excitement while it lasted. Tommy Martindale was unable to answer the bell after he had won the first fall and it was because Kamenoff the Mad Russian couldn't stand to be beaten.

Martindale won the initial fall, and as he was walking to his corner Kamenoff planted a foot in the middle of his back sending Martindale through the ropes, striking his head against the ring post. Martindale, after striking the ring post, fell to the floor outside the ring unconscious. While Henning, who was serving as the referee, worked over Martindale, Kamenoff stood in the ring showing

ing the large Armory crowd his muscles, and everything except the kitchen stove was thrown into the ring by the fans.

Henning had to give the match and McCrea and Jackson were unable to answer the bell of the second round.

Henning and Lou Cline, a newcomer to the basin wrestling fans, started the evening off with plenty of action for the fans before the semi-windup and main event came to be.

Cline won the first fall with a rolling step over toe hold, and Henning returned to take the second fall with his allegator clutch. In the third round Cline had John Paul in another rolling toe hold but Henning put the stop to it and applied his own toe hold to take the final fall.

NEW YORK (AP)—This early, with the season so very young it's scarcely begun to breathe, there's already a strong suspicion here that a great many of the nation's baseball experts have made a bad mistake in assessing the Giants' chances in the National League race. If it isn't too late to be legal, we would like to take a flyer on Leo Durocher's lads to beat out the Dodgers.

EXAMINING

The trouble was that most of the savants, including this one, have been busy all spring examining the teeth of the Dodgers and the Milwaukee Braves down in Florida while the Polo Grounders were setting themselves good and ready out West. None who did not actually see the club play with Willie Mays back in center field quite believed the reported transformation in an outfit that dropped its last 10 games with Brooklyn last season and limped home fifth.

Even the news that the Giants were ripping up their old sparring partner, the Cleveland Indians, failed to make much of an impression on the Florida Brigade. So what? Nobody was going to beat the Dodgers. Least of all a .280 hitting Negro boy who had just finished two years in the Army. The kid from Fairfield, Ala., couldn't make that big a difference if he were triplets.

FIGHTING CLUB

That was what we said, and that was before we saw the Giants play with 2-year-old Willie back in center and Durocher, breaking every managerial rule, move out of his private boudoir and change his clothes right in the locker room alongside his players. Let us face it, men, this really is a new, fighting ball club, and it's got muscles.

Why a single player can make such a profound difference in a team which is composed of 25 or more grown athletes has ever been one of the game's major mysteries. He comes to bat only in turn, maybe four times per game, and he won't average much better than one hit. He won't make many fielding plays that a teammate might not have made. And yet, over the season, his presence in the lineup can inspire a team to win a flag. Whatever that amazing quality is, there can be no doubt that Mays has it.

LaMotta Loses Comeback

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Former champion Jake LaMotta gave the middleweight division no cause for alarm about his comeback as he dropped a 10-round split decision Wednesday night to unrated Billy Kilgore.

Kilgore, a ham-and-egger fighting for the biggest purse of his career, seemed a bit awed by LaMotta's reputation in the early rounds, but quickly gained confidence when he found he could take the "Bronx Bull's" best blows without blinking.

Then the Miamian came on with a stabbing left jab and enough good rights to Jake's head and body to win the nod from Referee Peley Sarron and Judge Gus Jacobson.

Sarron voted for Kilgore 97-95. Jacobson gave him a 98-94 edge. Judge Carl Gardner thought, LaMotta won 98-93.

LaMotta, a 3-1 favorite, had none of the steam in his punches that enabled him to win the middleweight crown in 1949 and defend it for two years. Several times, he landed squarely on Kilgore's jaw with both rights and lefts and the Miamian came off unhurt.
