



Small Business Group Officers Visit Klamath; Chamber Men Hear Reports

"We represent a businessman's government agency," John G. Barnett, Portland branch manager of Chamber of Commerce forum at the Small Business Administration, told the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce forum at noon Wednesday.

He indicated that he and Reg Sheard, Portland loan manager for SBA, were in Klamath Falls this week to inspect five different local

plants which have made application for financial assistance.

Small businesses, according to Barnett, are firms which are independently owned and operated and do not dominate the industry. Since the office opened in Portland the first of the year, more than 370 business visitors have called at his office, he said. Purpose of the office is to assist el-

ible firms to obtain money through private institutions, local banks or private industry.

Loans, according to Barnett, occupy only about a third of the business of the SBA office. The other two-thirds of the staff's time is taken up with government procurement, relocation of industry, engineering advice and assistance and other matters relating to the preservation and expansion of competitive private enterprise business.

The Portland guests were intro-

duced by George P. Davis, president of the chamber, who presided at the meeting.

EUGENE (AP) — The state arson squad was called Wednesday to investigate a fire which razed Thomson's Lodge, a fishing resort on the McKenzie River 32 miles east of here.

The blaze, discovered about midnight, leveled the vacant structure swiftly.

Dayton Thomson, the owner, estimated loss at about \$30,000 with about half of it covered by insurance.

Thomson said electricity had been turned off and he was unable to account for the blaze. State police here reported the call for the arson squad.

The lodge, long a favorite on the river, had offered lodgings to such fishermen as Herbert Hoover, Gen. Hap Arnold and Gen. Mark Clark.
