

Henley Hornets Win Hayward Class C Title

Second Straight Crown

Henley Hornets recaptured the class C crown of the Hayward Relays at Eugene yesterday, by rolling up 35 points to beat out Lowell and Rogue River, who placed second and third respectively with 27 and 16 points.

Al Fairchild's trackmen, who won the C division title last year, continued to dominate track circles by taking two firsts, one second, a third and one fourth to pile up their point total.

The high jump team of Ray Searcy, Bob Hill and Lou Zarosinski won the first top place for the Hornets, and the sprint medley team of Bob Enman, Mel Kaylor, Ronnie Kaylor and tied with Rogue River for first place.

The Klamath County entry took second place in the distance medley with Ralph Bracamones, Rod Wright, John Moffet and Henry Williams carrying the load.

Bob Enman, Rod Wright, Bob Hill and Ron Kaylor placed third in the 40 yard relay to add six more points to the Hornets' total.

The fourth place was picked up by Lou Zarosinski in the shot put relay.

Other top scores in Class C competition were racked up by Gervis 16, Drain 13, Canyonville 10, Monroe 9, Crane 5, Mapleton 4, Yoncola 2, Chemawa and Jefferson 1. Canyonville set a distance medley record, while Henley and Rogue River tied the sprint medley record when the two relay teams ended in a dead heat.

The Klamath Union High School Pellias are in competition today for the Metropolitan title. Medford is the favorite and returning champion.

Wes Santee After Mile Record

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP) — Wes Santee hoped to run the Glenn Cunningham Mile in good "meet record time" and then help his teammates with a fast anchor baton trick in the 29th annual Kansas relays Saturday.

According to Santee, the much talked about but yet to be accomplished 4-minute mile wasn't his goal this time. "The nation's fastest middle distance star was shooting for the Cunningham Mile record of 4:10.1 held jointly by Blaine Riedout, North Texas State, and Don Gehrmann, of Wisconsin. And he said he also was aiming for a good anchor mile in either the distance or sprints medley relay."

Nearly 1,000 athletes representing 64 colleges, universities and junior colleges from almost all sections of the country were entered in the meet.

Ft. Lawton Moves Into Fourth Place

SEATTLE (AP) — With activity limited to booster teams only one change was made in American Bowling Congress standings in Friday's abbreviated sessions. The change saw the Ft. Lawton, Wash., Headquarters Battery booster team move into fourth place in that division with a 2781 pin fall.

AUGUSTA, Ga. — Ben Hogan, whose chief aim this spring is to win his fifth U.S. Open title at Baltusrol, Springfield, N.J., says a golf swing is only a minor part of the game.

Hogan will shoot from scratch at Baltusrol, 12 days before the national open. Golfers throughout the country will use their local handicaps or the Lionel Gallaway system of handicapping on any course they choose to play.

It is estimated that 12 per cent will "defeat" Hogan and win "I Beat Ben Hogan" medals.

Red Wings Win Stanley Cup Playoff

DETROIT (AP) — Tony Leswick, smallest player on either team, fired a big "sudden death" overtime goal Friday night to give the Detroit Red Wings a 2-1 victory over the Montreal Canadiens and wrest the Stanley Cup from the fighting Frenchmen.

The 5-foot-7 forward, paid primarily to play defensive hockey, hit the jackpot with a 40-foot screen shot at 4:29 of the overtime period in the seventh and deciding game of the cup playoffs.

Until his payoff goal, the Red Wings were willing under furious pressure by the Canadiens, seeking to climax one of hockey's great comebacks.

Leswick's sudden shot, through a tangle of players, smashed the comeback hopes and gave the Red Wings their sixth Stanley Cup championship. It also capped a brilliant season which saw them capture their sixth straight National Hockey League title, an unprecedented feat.

SOC Added To OC Conference

Word was received yesterday afternoon that Southern Oregon College has been accepted as a member of the Oregon Collegiate Conference.

According to Oregon Technical Institute Director Winston Purvine, the Ashland school was voted into the conference by a vote of the members this week.

Purvine received a telegram from Dr. Stephen Epler, the president of the conference, notifying him of the selection. Epler is also president of Portland State College, in Portland.

The movement will be effective September 1, 1954, according to the telegram.

There is a possibility that next year's Oregon Tech-Southern Oregon football game will be hard to fit into both schedules, being that OTI has a full schedule of nine games. The only open date on the Tech schedule is filled on the Red Raiders slate.

The relation between the two schools, Oregon Tech and Southern Oregon, were broken off two years ago after the Owls waxed the Raiders football team 89-0.

Rex Hunsaker, athletic director of OTI, told the Herald and News, yesterday afternoon that he "thinks the addition of SOC will 'strengthen the league and make it an all-around better conference.'"

Geographically, SOC will be the best situation in the conference for the Owls to play, either in football or basketball, because of the short distance between the two schools.

A meeting of the conference representatives will be held the last of this month to try and arrange the schedules of the schools involved in the change.

Oregon Tech, according to Hunsaker has already made plans for the Ashland school to be placed on the Owls 1955 schedule.

Horses Saved From Barn Fire

BOSTON (AP) — Four race horses valued at a total of \$25,000 perished and 24 others were rescued Friday night when fire destroyed a large barn at Suffolk Downs — which opens its spring meeting next Monday. A stablehand and a firefighter were injured.

The dead horses are the Revel Stable's Gay Cotton, valued by owner Russell Gruber of New Orleans, La., at \$10,000, and Hopetful Sue, Uncle B, and Baby's Bid, owned by William Resseque, also of New Orleans. He valued each of the three at \$5,000.

Cause of the fire was undetermined.

The horses were part of a string of 30 brought in for the 37-day meeting which opens the track's 20th season.

The 53-stall, 290-foot barn was destroyed at a loss estimated unofficially at \$5,000. Fire walls prevented the blaze from spreading to other barns.

Johnson Upsets Ward

NEW YORK (AP) — George Johnson, a 23-year-old Trenton, N.J., puncher, scored an upset Friday night when he stopped muscular Moses Ward of Detroit in 1:19 of the fifth round of a thrilling bout at St. Nicholas Arena.

As a result of his stand-out victory — his 17th straight — the wiry, Florida-born fighter was in line for a lucrative match with welterweight contender Johnny Saxton in Philadelphia May 17 or 19.

Philadelphia matchmaker Pete Moran, who saw Johnson beat the 6-5 favored Ward, said he hoped to make the Johnson-Saxton match in the arena.

Johnson was trailing on the cards of all three officials two rounds to one, when he caught up with the fast-punching and strongly built Detroit in the fourth.

Midway in the fourth, Ward shot a right to Johnson's ribs. As he did so he lowered his left hand and exposed his jaw. Johnson smashed a right to Ward's jaw which sent Moses reeling to the ropes. Johnson then let loose with everything he had in a full minute barrage of over 60 punches.

Ward pushed his way out to mid-ring, but ran into three rights which dropped him. He scrambled up at two, grabbing Johnson's legs to do so, and then reeled across the ring to the ropes. The bell rang as referee Pete Scalzo's count reached seven of the mandatory eight count.

Ward stormed after his foe at the start of the fifth. Then he was nailed again by a right. Three more rights to the head had Moses wobbling and Scalzo stopped the fight.

It was Johnson's 27th win against three defeats and his 21st knockout triumph. He hasn't lost since he was stopped by Baby Day 28 months ago. Ward dropped his third in a row. His record now is 17-5-2.

William Cranston, captain of Yale's freshman tennis team last spring, is ranked fourth in the United States in junior singles. He's now on the Eli varsity.

The 10th annual Men's City Bowling Tournament will close tonight with the doubles, singles and all-events champions being named in two classes.

In last night's action at Lucky Lanes, the class A doubles were completely rewritten from the night before. Erhardt Blind and Lawrence Hipke rolled to the lead of the A doubles with a 1262 pin total.

Second and third places also changed hands. The new second place holder is the team of George Thomas and Don Thomas, a brother combination, who rolled to a 1230 score. Art Cherry and Ivan Bold took over third spot with 1228 pins.

The B doubles had only one change in the top three places. Vance Hawley and Russ Avery kept the lead with their total of 1253, but second place went to Gene Hutchison and Norbert Schlepper who combined talents for a 1223 pin total in the point column.

George Grant and Warren Scott, who held second place after Thursday night's action, slipped to third spot with their 1183 score.

Carl Lane took the lead in A singles with a 673 total, and Jack Bothwell was in second spot with a 655 score. Third place holder, Lundy Clinton, was just one pin short of second spot with a 654 score.

In B singles, Dick Gallagher and Virgil Noel continue to lead the pack with their scores of 664 and 661 respectively. Not far behind in third place is John Campbell with a 633 total.

Bob Charlies took the lead in the class A all-events with a 1682 margin, while Al Woudt was second with a score of 1652. Third place in the A division of all-events went to Carl Lane with his 1644.

John Campbell rolled to the lead in B all-events with Dick Gallagher in second place. Campbell combined events for his 1517 total and Gallagher rolled a 1596. Third place is held by Russ Brackman, who has a combination score of 1473.

Bowling continued this afternoon at Lucky Lanes and will continue until close to midnight. When action finishes tonight the new men's champions will be named.
