New Arrivals Study English

The hopes of a family to reach America, have been fulfilled with the arrival of Mrs. Albert (Mara) Bustiani and her two young daughters, Maria Vittoria, 9, and Guilianna, 8 on March 1.

They joined Mr. Bustiani at Pelican City to make their home, after a trip to this country aboard the S.S. Andrea Doria. Bustiani has been here since June 5, 1953. It

took nine days from Genoa, Italy. An uncle, A. Conforti, made three attempts in 1947, 1950 and 1953, before all arrangements were completed for the family's trip, from their home at Pajsafratta, Pisa.

In Italy, the family was in the restaurant business and Mrs. Bustiani taught school. Bustiani served in World War II and worked with American troops. These contacts fired his interest in coming here to live.

The entire family is receiving lessons two nights a week in English from Lido Botti, of the KUHS staff. Both children are in school half days at Pelican City, but both are eager to go full days to speed up lessons. Maria is in the 4th grade, Guilianna in the 2nd. Both have learned the familiar Yankee greeting "Hi!", with many other words in the vocabulary. In turn, students at Pelican are picking up Italian.

The family is musical, is familiar with television, but marvel at American gadgets.

Mrs. Bustiana expressed appreciation for the wonderful treatment they have received since coming here, and for the help that is being given to assist them in making the adjustments to an entirely different tempo of living.

Bustiani is employed in the Eldorado Mill.

Spud Testing Report Told

Test planting reports for 21 samples of commercial potatoes grown in the greenhouses at Corvallis show 80 per cent of these lots to carry excessive percentages of leaf roll, Walt Jendrzewski, county extension agent reported today.

Sixteen of the 21 samples are reported to carry leaf roll percentages ranging from three to over 20 per cent. Only one of the 21 lots were reported below one per cent leaf roll.

According to Jendrzewski, growers can expect difficulty from net necrosis when seed planted carries leaf roll percentages in excess of one per cent.

Extensive planting of single drop seed from commercial lots is likely to result in dumping of an appreciable percentage of the 1954 russet crop, the agent warns.

Murder Sentence Recommended

ROSEBURG (AP) — Thomas S. Bouse, convicted of first degree murder in the bathtub drowning of his wife, will be sentenced Monday to life imprisonment.

The circuit court jury which found him guilty Friday recommended the sentence which is to be imposed by Judge James R. Bain.

It was the second time Bouse has been convicted of drowning his wife, Ethel, in the bathtub at their Roseburg home on August 8, 1952.

He was sentenced to die in the state gas chamber after the first conviction. The case was appealed to the State Supreme Court, however, and a new trial was ordered on the grounds there had been errors in the first trial.

Bouse pleaded innocent in both trials. At the second trial he said his mind went blank after his wife told him she planned to divorce him.

Crater Ranger Transferred

Richard M. Ward, ranger at Crater Lake National Park, is being transferred from the park to McKinley National Park, Alaska, as assistant chief ranger.

Ward was graduated as a forester from Oregon State College in 1936. He served as seasonal ranger at Yellowstone the summers of 1947, 1948, 1949 and 1950 and accepted a permanent assignment at Crater Lake June 10, 1951.

He will leave for Alaska about May 7.

A native of Philomath, he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. T. Ward, longtime publishers of the weekly newspaper at Philomath.

No successor has been named, according to Lou W. Hallock, chief ranger at Crater Lake.

Others testifying were Martin Skriver, a former mayor of Newport; Robert Brayton, a Newport accountant; Allan Reed, publisher of the Delake weekly newspaper; Floyd Stager, a Taft attorney; Guy Griswold, supervisor of Oregon Liquor Commission inspectors in the coastal area; and Otto Cahill, a Delake resident who is in active in a group which has criticized law enforcement in the county.

The hearing was recessed until Monday.

The Rhee Line is an arbitrary boundary some 60 miles off the south Korean coast. The ROK government has restricted the zone to Korean fishermen.
