### Soil Firm Announces Changes

**BOISE, Idaho**—Resignation of E. W. (Ernie) Hansen as manager of the J. R. Simplot Company's fertilizer sales division was announced today by Robert I. Troxell, executive vice president of the company.

Troxell said Hansen would enter private business in north Idaho, and that he would be succeeded as fertilizer division sales manager by Ben D. McCollum. McCollum has been manager of the Simplot Soilbuilder at Klamath Falls, Oregon.

Jack Barbour, assistant to McCollum at Klamath Falls for the last four years, will assume the management there, Troxell added.

McCollum will make his headquarters at Pocatello, where the company's fertilizer plant is located, Troxell said. Activities of the various Soilbuilder units will be correlated at the general office in Boise by Grant Kilbourne.

The company has Soilbuilder units located at Greeley and Swink Colorado; Idaho Falls, Twin Falls, Ruper, Jerome, Boise and Caldwell, Idaho; Ontario, Adams and Klamath Falls, Oregon; and Walla Walla, Dayton, Pomeroy and Moss Lake, Washington. Troxell said other units will be established at Pullman, Washington and Moscow, Idaho.

Hansen has been with the Simplot Company for nine years, and prior to that time was with the Union Pacific railroad at Omaha, Nebraska. Hansen said he would head up his own company to handle specialized types of fertilizer at Craigmont and Lewiston.

McCollum, the new sales manager, was Soilbuilder manager at Klamath Falls for six years. Prior to that, he was with the company for a short while at Twin Falls. He came to Idaho from the agronomy department of the University of Arkansas.

against any such resolution.

President Eisenhower told his news conference Feb. 10 that no one could be more bitterly opposed to getting the United States involved in a hot war in Indochina than he was. Consequently, he said every move he authorized was calculated, as far as humans could do it, to make certain that does not happen.

**IKK PLEDGE**

The storm over the Indochina statement overshadowed a controversy over President Eisenhower's pledge yesterday that the United States will maintain a "fair share" of troops in Europe for "defense of the continent" while a threat to that area exists.

The President's declaration, issued from his vacation headquarters at Augusta, Ga., was addressed to the prime ministers of the six nations involved in the projected European Defense Community. U. S. officials indicated it was aimed at encouraging the reluctant French to join the organization.

Chairman Saltonstall (R-Mass) of the Senate Armed Services Committee said he was asking Secretary of Defense Wilson to describe the "official nature of the commitment."

Sen. Mansfield (D-Mont), a Foreign Relations Committee member, predicted there will be discussion in the Senate of what he said was the administration's failure to tell members of the Armed Services and Foreign Relations Committees about the announcement. Administration sources said it had been discussed with both Republican and Democratic leaders.
