Former FHA Chief To Be Questioned

 WASHINGTON (AP)—Guy T. O. Hollyday, ousted last week as commissioner of the Federal Housing Administration, today faced questioning from the Senate Banking Committee about what he did—or did not do—to combat reported multimillion-dollar swindles in the government's housing program.

Chairman Capehart (R-Ind.), naming Hollyday as the first witness in the Banking Committee probe, said in an interview that housing officials had "consistently" told the senator "that this could never happen."

He referred to his own estimate that up to half a billion dollars in "windfall" profits went to apartment builders who got government-insured loans bigger than the cost of the apartments they built.

The Indiana senator was also reported preparing an elaborate "record," taken from past hearings, in an effort to show that committee members repeatedly cautioned housing officials about possible abuses in the federally financed, postwar apartment-building program.

Albert M. Cole, head of the Housing and Home Finance Agency (HHFA) which supervises the FHA, said after President Eisenhower requested Hollyday's resignation last week that Hollyday himself was "a fine Christian gentleman." But he said he was dissatisfied with the investigation and enforcement action taken by FHA

under Hollyday's leadership. Expanding on the situation in a televised interview last night, Cole said one housing official has been accused of "serious" charges of taking money in connection with irregularities in the housing program. He did not name the official, but said the man has not yet offered to "explain his side of the situation." Cole's agency and the FBI are investigating the whole situation.

TV Film Scripts Borrowed From Literary Classics

 HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Today Fireside Theater finishes its 390th telefilm, and there seems to be no end in view for this popular series.

The first Fireside Theater half hour was "Time Bomb," suspense drama with John Mitchum which cost \$8,000. It was made in 1949. Today's edition is a light comedy called "Second Elopement" with Virginia Field. The tab: \$22,500.

In between these two films, Fireside Theater has pioneered the filmed television field and has managed to climb into and remain among the top ranks in audience ratings. The guiding genius behind the show is a waspish Lithuanian named Frank Wisbar. I paid a 200th anniversary call at his office in what used to be the old Eagle-Lion movie studio. It now thrives with TV film activity.

I caught Wisbar for a few minutes in between this race from the daily rushes to the set. He has directed, produced, cast and supervised all 300 of the films.

"What's more, I wrote them for the first three years," he said. "I stood on street corners and asked writers if they wouldn't turn out scripts for \$45 a copy. I had no trunk full of stories myself, so I had to raid the public-domain classics. I looted Chekhov, plundered De Maupassant and stripped Robert Louis Stevenson."

Nowadays he relies on more modern authors. His script bills sometimes amount to \$4,500.

But the money wasn't that good in the pioneer days—way back in the dark ages of TV five years ago. To put together his first film, Wisbar says he mortgaged and second-mortgaged his home.

"In those days, you had to lie, brag and exaggerate to get backing," he remarked. "You would go to a money man and tell him what you think the situation would be with TV films. You could talk about reruns, but he would ask, 'Does anyone know what reruns will bring?' You had to admit no, no one had ever tried it. It was pioneering all the way."

French Get U.S. Planes

MANILA (AP)—A U.S. aircraft carrier has completed delivery of an undisclosed number of planes to French forces in Indochina, a spokesman at U.S. Naval Headquarters, Sangley Point, said Monday.

The spokesman declined to say which carrier had made the delivery. The U.S. carriers Essex and Boxer arrived in Manila Bay over the weekend but it was not reported whether either handled the project or a third carrier was involved.

The Essex and Boxer, which relieved the Wasp, have been in the China Sea for several weeks.
