

# Windshield Spots Seen In Oregon

PORTLAND (AP) — Tiny specks of an ash-like substance showered several areas of Northwestern Oregon over the weekend and almost immediately, police began receiving reports of pitted automobile windshields.

Reports of unusual pitting began some time ago in Northwest Washington. Last week pitting was reported by motorists in Southern Washington and over the weekend reports of similar occurrences came from Canton, Ohio; Waco, Texas; Chicago, San Francisco and other points.

The round carbon-like particles are not responsible for unusual windshield pitting—if there is any—in Oregon, a Portland scientist reported.

Dr. Arthur Livermore, radiologist and chemist at Reed College here, said the particles had no effect on glass. They appeared to be oil ashes formed under intense heat, he said. But they might be of volcanic origin, he added.

The particles have no measurable radioactivity. They probably carry a small electrical charge, which makes them stick to glass, Livermore said.

The specks probably called motorists attention to heretofore unnoticed pits on their windshields, Livermore speculated.

The origin of the carbon particles has not been determined. They first were reported blowing in from the ocean at Astoria on the Oregon Coast Saturday. There is no industry in the area that could account for the ash.

Later in the day, they were found in Portland. They are soft, shiny gray pellets about 1-32 of an inch in diameter. The fall was not heavy, but was noticeable.

There was no damage reported to window glass, houses, paint, plants, or other objects on which the specks had fallen.

Another report of unusual windshield pitting came from Redmond, Ore. Mrs. Mary Brown, co-publisher of the Redmond Spokesman, said a man drove his car over for her to see the 100 pits that had appeared in his windshield overnight.

Mrs. Brown said that as she watched, several more pits appeared and that splinters of glass, about the size of a pinhead, fell onto the car's hood.

No ash pellets were reported in the Redmond area.

# Navy Employe Hearing Slated

WASHINGTON (AP) — Abraham Chasnow, who says he was fired by the Navy as a security risk even though he had been cleared by a hearing board, will get a chance to say why he should be reinstated.

The Navy offered Sunday to rehear the case and Chasnow's lawyer promptly accepted. The new hearing may come this week.

A Navy employe for 23 years, Chasnow was fired from an \$8,360-a-year job at the Navy hydrographic office April 8 after the Navy security appeal board overruled a lower board's finding that he was innocent of eight charges of Communist associations. Chasnow said he was discharged without explanation.

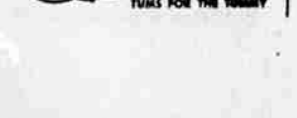

# Lawyer Files New Motion

A new legal twist developed Monday in the Raymond J. Bodinet parlor house holdup case when a motion was filed in Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg's court by the defendant's attorney in an attempt to gain possession of an alleged confession obtained by the district attorney's office.

Defense Attorney A. C. Yaden told the court that before he could determine what plea he will enter on behalf of his client to an armed robbery charge, he must be able to inspect certain written admissions alleged to have been made by Bodinet.

District Attorney Frank Alderson argued against the motion and contended the defense would have ample time at the trial to inspect the alleged confession.

It is reported that Bodinet signed a confession to his part in the alleged holdup at Myrtle's parlor house on January 8 during which Edwin Coyle, an alleged accomplice in the robbery, was slain by a Klamath Falls policeman.

The shooting touched off a one-man vice crusade by District Attorney Alderson which led to the arrest of Paulia Benton, purported operator of the parlor house. She is the state's chief witness against Bodinet. A charge of operating a bawdy house is pending against her in district court.

Since his arrest January 8 Bodinet has been held in the county jail in lieu of \$10,000 bond. In the meantime, he has been indicted twice by the Klamath County Grand Jury and arraigned three times on an armed robbery charge.

The motion to allow inspection of the alleged Bodinet confession was taken under advisement by Judge Vandenberg. He indicated he will rule on the issue when Bodinet appears to plead to the armed robbery charge next Friday.
