Land Yield Tests Told

Chiseling of grain lands in the spring may not be the wise thing to do, particularly if the soil is not irrigated following the field chiseling, reports Ken Baghott, Tulelake farm adviser.

Tests conducted in the past three years by Baghott in cooperation with Wesley St. Peter, Panhandle homesteader, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and other farmers in the basin, have demonstrated that average grain yields from chiseled fields are usually somewhat less than from plowed or disced fields. The average grain yields the past three years have been nine per cent less on chiseled fields than on disced or plowed fields. No apparent difference has been noted between the disced and plowed fields.

The Farm Adviser says that growers who wish to chisel grain fields should do so in the fall of the year, or irrigate after the chiseling operation in the spring. Apparently the grain seedlings tend to become exposed to a drying soil condition which may somewhat limit its stouling of the grain and through the growing season cause excessive evaporation of soil moisture.
