

# Child Makes Miraculous Recovery

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—The parents of brown-eyed Patricia Joy Payne believe they have experienced first hand the miracle of Easter.

To Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Payne of Duncan, Okla., it was their own personal Easter miracle. Their 6-year-old daughter stopped breathing and came to life again.

Patricia was struck on the head by a swing at school Wednesday. The only visible harm was a scratch above the ear. After a while, the hurting stopped and she returned to classes.

At home that evening, she assured her mother, "It doesn't bother me any more." She felt well enough to go to a movie.

Then, with shocking suddenness, she lapsed into a coma.

Thursday came. She failed to regain consciousness.

Doctors decided to bring her here. Still another day passed and she lay unconscious.

Saturday morning, the real crisis came.

"I was here by myself and I saw her take her last breath," Payne recounted. She gasped once, and lay still.

"The nurses and doctor came quickly and started giving her artificial respiration," he said. It was decided only an emergency operation would save her.

During the operation doctors said she stopped breathing again. But the surgeon found the trouble and removed it—a blood clot on the brain.

On Easter morning Patricia "came to life again." She awoke from the deep and near deadly sleep into which she had fallen four days before.

"This is the happiest Easter we've ever had," her parents said.

# Labor Policy Group Reports

The Policy Committee of the International Woodworkers of America, CIO, met in Portland Friday analyzed the outcome of the recent referendum strike ballot, reviewed the present economic conditions of the lumbering industry and finalized the following points:

1. The membership cast the largest strike-vote ever tabulated by this Union. Every region in the Northwest voted in favor of the strike being called.
  2. The economics of the industry and factors relating to it already indicated that all sections of the industry are ahead of 1952's big year in production, sales and orders.
  3. Hourly productivity of the workers has increased about 10 per cent in the last two years but the workers have not derived any benefits from it.
  4. The strike deadline is set for Monday May 3, 1954. It will commence at the beginning of the day shift, whatever hour that may be in a particular operation.
  5. The Union will continue in negotiations with the Employers up to the May 3rd deadline.
  6. The Districts and the Locals are now in the process of organizing their strike machinery such as the selection of picket captains, picket crews, banners, etc.
- The Union's demands in these negotiations are: (1) 12½ cent per hour wage increase across-the-board; (2) correction of job rate inequities based on job analysis of the industry; (3) three weeks' vacation after 5 years.

# Women Prefers Truman Message

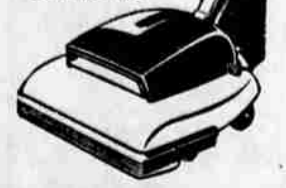

# Snow Over North Areas

Cloudy skies brought a variety of precipitation to sections of the northern half of the nation Monday, but the weather was generally fair and mild in the southern half.

In between — in East Central Colorado and Northwestern Kansas — dust was blowing.

There was light snow in North Central Montana to the accompaniment of freezing temperatures on the Northern Great Plains. Cut Bank, Mont., had three inches of snow Sunday and Lewistown one inch. The thermometer read 29 at Cut Bank early Monday and 27 at Bismark, N.D.

The band of showers ran from South Central New York to Northern Indiana, and light rains also fell in Western Nebraska and Northeastern Wyoming. Slightly heavier amounts were recorded in coastal Washington, and fog lay over the Pacific Coast to the south.

Early morning weather reports included: Caribou, Maine, 38, partly cloudy; New York, 58, partly cloudy; Miami 66, cloudy; New Orleans 66, clear; Kansas City 58, partly cloudy; Yuma, Ariz., 81, partly cloudy; Los Angeles 57, cloudy; Seattle 40, cloudy; Wausau, Wis., 43, cloudy; Rockford, Ill., 46, Partly cloudy; South Bend, Ind., 49, cloudy; Cadillac, Mich., 42, cloudy; and Cedar Rapids, Iowa, 52 light showers.

# Use Of Daylight Saving Time Varies Over Nation

Daylight saving time rolls around again next Sunday for millions of Americans. Other millions will ignore it.

As in the past, about 45 per cent of the population will set clocks ahead one hour; 55 per cent will not.

Opposition traditionally has centered in rural areas. Many farmers say that cows and pigs don't know how to tell time, but do know when the sun comes up. Animals get upset if you monkey with the clock, the argument goes. Others say their hired hands would have to stand around waiting for the dew to dry before harvesting certain crops if they went on daylight time.

In the bigger cities, however, industrial and office workers like daylight saving, particularly the extra hour in the evening when they can weed the flower bed or play catch with Junior.

There are a few new wrinkles this year. Three New England states—Massachusetts, Rhode Island and New Hampshire—decided to extend daylight saving for an extra month, until the last Sunday in October.

The usual span is from the last Sunday in April to the last Sunday in September, which is Sept. 26 this year.

In the District of Columbia, Congress acts as a town council. Last year, it didn't get around to debating the issue until the last moment and much confusion resulted among government workers. This year Congress turned over the power to decide about daylight saving to the district commissioners. It goes into effect automatically at 2 a.m. Sunday.

Some states, like Indiana and Kentucky, have laws forbidding official daylight saving time. Yet there are ways of getting around it.

The Indiana law, for instance, provides no penalty. So various city councils adopt annual resolutions authorizing it for the general public. But the clocks in public buildings grind along on standard time.

The same goes for many train schedules where daylight saving is observed. The railroads keep their clocks ticking on standard time, but timetables are advanced to conform with the fast time.

Some states are on standard time except for tiny areas. Virginia sticks to its guns except in the metropolitan area around Washington.

The West Virginia Panhandle, where industrial Wheeling is located, goes for daylight saving. The rest of the state doesn't.
