

Lane, Boe Capture Singles Championships



One of the largest bowling tournaments ever held in Klamath Falls ended Saturday night at Lucky Lanes bowling alley, when the 10th Annual City Men's Bowling Tournament drew to a close.

Carl Lane and Aaron Boe finished the tourney with the highest scores in class A and B singles respectively. Lane led the A leggers with a 673 total and Boe was atop the B alley with a 675 score.

In the class A all-events, Charlie Booth and Don Ferguson led the way. Booth compiled a pin total of 1692, while Ferguson captured second place with combined totals of 1688.

In the class B all-events, Carl Brown totaled his scores to the 1561 mark for top spot in his division and John Campbell rolled an all-events score of 1517 pins for second place.

The class A division double champions Erhardt Blind and Lawrence Hildebrand, who won last year's class B doubles title, rolled a doubles score of 1262 to beat the team of Don Ferguson and Clayton Sweazy, who combined scores for a 1243 total.

Third place in the A doubles went to George Thomas and his brother Don, as the brother team collected a 1230 score. Art Cherry and Ivan Bold tied for fourth place with Charlie Booth and Harry Bray, each team having a 1228 score for the tourney's action.

In B doubles, a father-son team of Bert Reis and Jim Reis turned in the top score of 1279, while Vince Hawley and Russ Avery, who were leading the B division until Saturday evening, settled for second spot with a 1253.

One point behind in third place was the team of Robert Rutter and Andy Tooley, who knocked over 1251 pins. John McDonald and Bob Pepple took fourth place honors with a 1246 total.

Second place in class A singles went to Jack Malone who rolled a 671 total. Jack Bothwell took third place with his 255 pin total, and fourth place went to Don Miller and Lundy Clinton who tied with a 654 score.

In B singles, Bob Cox was second to Boe with his 666 and Dick Gallagher wound up third with his 662 total.

Fourth and fifth places in the B division went to Virgil Noel and John Campbell with their scores of 661 and 653 respectively.

Owls Take Pair From Lumberjacks

Oregon Tech took two games from Humboldt State over the weekend at Eureka, California, while dropping one to the Lumberjacks.

Tech won the Saturday night contest in eleven innings, 6-5 and Humboldt came back in the first game of a doubleheader and downed the Klamath Falls team 5-4. The Owls second win came in the nightcap with a 6-0 shutout over the home-standing "Jacks."

In Saturday night's game, OT's catcher, Dick Joslyn, opened the eleventh inning with a smashing double, and on the next play scored on a squeeze play from second base with Warren Osborne on the sacrificing end of the bat.

Odie Canada and Joslyn led the Owl hitters with three hits in six trips to the plate apiece.

Art Kirkland's boys took a 4-0 lead going into the fifth inning of the game Sunday afternoon, but Humboldt State put together three and two run innings back to back and won the game by a one run margin.

Louise Suggs Wins Ladies Winter Tourney

BEAUMONT, Tex. (AP) — Sweet-swinging Louise Suggs of Atlanta held her fifth championship Monday as the ladies PGA winter tour came to a close and the gas of the fairways scattered for their homes—all except Babe Zaharias, who has a date with her doctors for a physical check.

Little Miss Suggs wrapped up the Babe Zaharias \$3,500 Open Sunday with a par 73 over the 6,219-yard Beaumont Country Club course that gave her 284 for the 54 holes and brought her \$700 more for her bulging bank account.

She has won the Titleholders Sea Island Open, Betsy Rawls Open, Carrolton Open and Zaharias Open as the top feminine linkster of the year.

Mrs. Zaharias, who made a gallant bid for the championship of the tournament named for her here in her home town, said the checkup with her doctors was "routine" and indicated she expected no adverse report on her progress from an operation for cancer here a year ago.

The Babe, who had been complaining of tiredness in the final rounds of tournaments along the tour, has said she won't be back on the golf swing for six weeks at least. Reports around the tournament here were that she might have to have another operation but she said Sunday, as she shot a 74 to finish second in the tournament with 226 that won her \$500, that she was feeling "grand."

As it was, only Sam and his publishers knew that great stacks of "Natural Golf," the Stammer's personal gift to golfing literature, were only awaiting Sam's one-stroke playoff victory over Ben Hogan before being rushed into the mails. This is a paper back, or "popular" edition, and is expected to carry the secrets of Snead's skills to millions, at least.

The only weakness we can find in Sam's sales talks is that he admits—nay, boasts—that he never took a golfing lesson in his life. One is free to infer too that he had been run off by hitting golf balls to have read anything on the subject. However, by the time the reader finds this out he's already spent his quarter.

The latest thing in amateur tennis tournaments is to be unfurled here next Monday night when Tony Trabert, the national champion, plays the nation's No. 2 star, Vic Seixas, in the opening match of a round robin series at the swank new Town Tennis Club in midtown Manhattan.
