Fight Planned In Court Case

A 25-year-old Mexican laborer who claims his constitutional rights are being violated and that he has been placed in "double jeopardy" was prepared to wage a fight for release from jail late Tuesday.

The defendant, Cruz Esqueta, is held on a disorderly conduct charge growing out of a shooting affray two months ago. He is accused of firing 20 shots into the residence of Charles Blair Knight on 21, of Hansen's Landing.

Knight, the prosecution's chief witness against Esqueta, is in the county jail serving 22½ days for driving a car while his operator's license was revoked.

Esqueta's case was taken before the county grand jury in March. The jury refused to indict him on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon.

Subsequently the district attorney's office filed an information in district court charging Esqueta with disorderly conduct. This charge was based on the same facts on which the grand jury refused to indict him.

Esqueta said he has retained an attorney and will fight the disorderly conduct charge on the grounds that his constitutional rights have been violated. A hearing was scheduled for 3 p.m. Tuesday before Attorney Ben Goddard, district judge pro tem.

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

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
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
