### Continued Spud Testing Requested At Tule Meet

TULELAKE — A continued need for additional information on potato fertilization was recently expressed by farmers at the annual Tulelake Agriculture Extension Service planning meeting. Some 60 farmers requested that the Tulelake farm adviser continue the test plot program on potato fertilization to determine the nitrogen and phosphate requirements of potatoes under various field conditions. Last year a plot conducted in the muck soil indicated that high rates of nitrogen fertilization paid, but that high rates of phosphorous did not add to the yield or qual-

ity of the potatoes. According to the farm adviser, ammonium sulfate and 16-20 were both tested in this year's plots. 700 pounds of 16-20 was tested against 700 and 500 pound rates of ammonium sulfate. Where the 700 pounds of 16-20 was used the average yield per acre of netted gem potatoes was 320 sacks and graded 78 per cent No. 1's at digging time. Where 700 pounds of ammonium sulfate was used the yield of potatoes was 362 sacks and graded 82 per cent No. 1's. The 500 pound application of ammonium sulfate yielded 323 sacks per acre graded 75 per-

cent No. 1's. Realizing that last year was a very poor potato year and the season was short, perhaps the heavy application of nitrogen paid good dividends. Normally 80 to 90 pounds of nitrogen is sufficient for maximum potato production. The farm adviser says that the reason the phosphate application

showed no increased yield was due to the fact that soil tests showed the soil contained 1.3 parts per million of water soluble phosphorous. This is enough available phosphorous to supply a sufficient amount for potato plant growth. At digging time no difference could be noted in the net or quality of the potato. The different treatments seemed to keep equally good in the cellar.

### Mill Beginning 1954 Operations

FORT KLAMATH—On Tuesday, April 13, Clay Thomas started operations for the season at his portable sawmill, located about a mile south of Fort Klamath on Fort Creek, at the William Zumbrun ranch property. A crew of seven men is employed at the mill, with Jim Whitlatch as sawyer.

Elmer (Dutch) Zumbrun, son of William Zumbrun, has contracted the logging this year and recently purchased a logging truck which he will use to haul logs to the mill and also to transport the cut lumber to Car-Ad-Co in Klamath Falls. Timber fallers working for Zumbrun are Gene Page and Fred McQuiston, who are now cutting trees on 40 acres of the Zumbrun ranch.

Capacity of Thomas' portable sawmill is from nine to ten thousand feet per day; this is the third year the sawmill has been operated locally, having been started on the R. Seth Dixon ranch west of Fort Klamath.

This year, Thomas is devoting his entire time to the sawmill and logging project; after having owned and managed the Old Fort Tavern and Cafe for several years.

January 1, 1954, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas leased, with option to buy, their local business to Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd C. Hauptman, Chemult, and are living at the Rightmeyer apartments here with their five year old daughter, Janet Rae.
