



Silver Lake Deer Country Toured; Bitterbrush Gains

Sportsmen from all parts of the state converged on Lake county recently to participate in a field inspection of the Silver lake deer winter range. The trip, highlighted by a well attended Saturday evening meeting at Summer lake and a tour of much of the Silver lake winter range on Sunday, was sponsored by the Oregon State Game Commission to display conditions existing on that range where severe deer losses have occurred in past years and to observe the numbers and condition of the deer herds which have been hunted heavily in recent years. Equally important was the opportunity to bring together sportsmen, ranchers, and representatives of state and federal agencies for a general discussion of mule deer management and its relation to other land uses.

was attended by some 140 interested participants. A 5-man panel including a rancher, a sportsman, and representatives of the U.S. Forest Service, the Bureau of Land Management, and the Oregon State Game Commission presented a well rounded summary of the land management programs and their relationship to maintenance of mule deer and recreation. One of those creating the most interest pertained to the problems arising from the use of private land for hunting by sportsmen. All were agreed that the relations between sportsmen and landowners are in need of improvement, and further, that improvement can come about only through a spirit of cooperation and an awareness on the part of the hunting public that hunting on private land is a privilege rather than a right. It was brought out in the meeting that progress has been made in areas where a cooperative effort

has been undertaken. All in the group had an opportunity to hear more than one side of a good many issues, and there is no question that everyone, including state and federal agency representatives, benefited materially from the exchange of information at the meeting.

On Saturday afternoon preceding the evening meeting many of the group were conducted on a tour of the Devils Garden winter range in northern Lake county, and on the way south from Horse ranch to Summer lake the group was able to observe a great many deer along the Fremont highway. Although many of the participants were enthusiastic about the number of deer observed, Bill Lightfoot, regional supervisor for the game commission in the southeast portion of the state, emphasized that had it been possible to hold the trip two or three weeks earlier at least ten times as many deer would have been observed.

On Sunday the group was conducted over much of the acces-

sible portion of the Silver lake winter range. Stops were made at several points where range conditions were examined. Local ranchers, representatives of federal land management agencies, and game commission men explained how the range was being managed and discussed a variety of techniques used in obtaining information about the range and the deer herds.

The trip ended on Ninemile ridge where, following lunch, an hour long discussion of still other aspects of range and deer herd management were brought out.

Although many portions of the ranges examined showed evidence

of severe overuse by deer this winter, substantial improvement of bitter brush and other preferred deer winter foods was seen in some areas. The deer were in excellent condition, and no evidence of recent losses by starvation was seen.
