

Kameroff Disqualified In Armory Main Event

Armory fans were happy, but Ivan Kameroff was very much displeased at Bill Fletcher's decision in last night's main event of the weekly wrestling program. Fletcher was acting as referee in a top notch grudge match, and when Kameroff used Tommy Martindale's half to throw him into the corner of the ropes and turnbuckles, disqualified the Russian. Fletcher had warned Kameroff about the hair pulling and other illegal tactics throughout the evening's action, but the Mad Russian thought that he could get away with more.

After Fletcher gave the decision to Martindale, Kameroff put on a tremendous show and claimed that everyone was collaborating against him in the Armory matches.

Martindale won the first fall of the evening's feature match with his rolling cradle, with a little more than 16 minutes gone in the match.

Kameroff won the second fall by working Martindale over and using his bear hug to take the fall, setting the stage for the third and final fall that backfired in Kameroff's face.

In the semi-windup bout, Georges Dusette used his old standby, the full Nelson, to put Gene Detton, who was subbing for John Paul Henning out of commission and was declared the winner when Detton was unable to return for the second round.

Detton, who comes from a long line of wrestlers, fought the full Nelson too long, and was in such a state that it was impossible for him to return.

The opener really started the evening's action off in good style when Juan Hernandez and Bill Fletcher fought it out to a draw after thirty minutes of wrestling. It was announced last night that Karl Grey and Buck Davison will appear on next week's program.

Wildcats Trip Tulelake

Errors and spotty pitching paved the way to a wild and high scoring win for the Klamath Union High School Wildcats over Malin by a 19-6 count on Wright Field Tuesday afternoon.

Malin jumped for two runs in the first inning, and the Wildcats came back in their half of the inning with three of their own runs on three hits.

The Wildcats exploded in the third for seven runs on four singles and six errors.

In the bottom of the fourth, Malin pushed across three runs on two hits, two Klamath errors and a base on balls.

The 'Cats added three more runs, boosting their total to 13, on a single and a long triple by Earl Tichenor, four base on balls and a sacrifice.

Malin closed the gap to a 13-10 count in their half of the sixth with five runs on three hits and an error.

Three Wildcat runs in the fifth on four hits and a base on balls gave the 'Cats additional insurance.

Malin scored six runs in the sixth to finish their scoring for the day. Klamath broke the 16-16 tie with three runs in the sixth on base hits by four 'Cat hitters.

Don Taucher and Dave Darnell had three hits in four times at bat for the 'Cats and Jerry Brannwell accounted for three more out of five times at bat. Lavon Travis poked out three hits for five times at the plate to lead Malin's hitters. Two of Travis' hits went for a homerun and triple.

Oregon Tech Splits With Red Raiders

Oregon Tech continued their pace on the baseball fields yesterday by splitting a doubleheader with the Red Raiders of Southern Oregon, with the Owls taking the first game 6-4 and dropping the nightcap 10-8, at Ashland.

The young bunch of ballplayers that have been supplying plenty of baseball savvy for Ashland's nine so far this year scored three runs in the top of the eighth inning to give OTI the first game victory.

Dick Joslyn opened the inning with a single, and after an SOC error, was forced at third on Lee Oliver's fielders choice. An outfield fly advanced the baserunners into scoring position, and on the next play both scored on a two-base error charged against the Raiders.

Pitcher Arvey Nelson singled home the third and final run of the inning with his second hit of the afternoon.

After the Raiders had taken a 3-2 lead in the third inning, the Owls came back in their half of the fourth frame to tie the game up and send it into extra innings.

The second contest saw SOC tally three times in the last two innings to sew up the game.

Three hits, an error and a base on balls did the trick for the home team in the fifth inning and they used two base on balls, a balk, a single and an Owl error for their final three counts.

In the Owl's half of the seventh inning, Joslyn opened with a single, Don Vest was safe on an error and Dave Savage was hit by a pitch.

With men on first, second, and third, Warren Osborne singled and Glen Marcum followed with another one base blow scoring the Owl's three runs, but two infield outs stopped the OTI rally.

Nelson's first game win gave him a 3-0 second in the win loss column. He compiled victories against Humboldt, twice, and yesterday's win over SOC.

Larry Oatney led the Owls at the plate in the first game with four hits in five trips and Nelson added two for four to the OTI hitting parade.

In the second game Marcum had two hits in as many tries and Joslyn connected for two safeties in four times at the plate.

This weekend the Owls meet Lassen Junior College in a three game series at Recreation Field. Saturday afternoon the two teams meet in a doubleheader, both games going seven innings.

The Sunday afternoon game will be a nine inning affair that will be attended by many high school seniors from all over the state and country who will be visiting OTI during Spring Vacation Weekend.

Game time Saturday is 1:00 and the Sunday single game will start at 1:30.
