NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN to the legal voters of Union High School District No. 2 of Klamath County, State of Oregon, that a special budget election will be held within the boundaries of said School District at the Klamath Union High School Building, located at Alameda and Cross Streets, in Klamath Falls, Oregon, on the 13th day of May, 1954, from the hour of two o'clock p.m. to the hour of eight o'clock p.m., to the effect of authorizing the levying of a tax in said Union High School District No. 2 for the fiscal year beginning on July 1, 1954, and ending on June 30, 1955, on all the taxable property within said Union High School District No. 2 outside the tax limitation imposed by Article XI, Section 11, of the Oregon Constitution, and (2) adopting or rejecting the following budget of estimated and itemized expenditures for said District for said fiscal year.
