

Pelicans Meet Ashland, Crater In Cinder Meet



ORIN PERKINS was adjusting the height of the high jump bar during practice sessions this week in preparation for this weekend's triangle meet with Ashland and Crater. The meet is scheduled to get underway at 1:30 tomorrow afternoon on the Modoc Field track.

Ashland and Crater travel over the Greenways to meet the Klamath Union High School Pelicans in a three way track meet tomorrow afternoon on the Modoc Field cinder paths at 1:30.

Ashland proved its strength two weeks ago in the Rogue River Regatta, that were held at Medford. Medford's Black Tornado track squad won the meet, but Ashland was a strong second. Klamath placed fifth and Crater followed in last place.

Coach Len Surles announced that the starting lineup for this weekend's meet will be the same as the entries in last Saturday's Hayward Relays.

In the Haywards, Klamath's Jim King looked especially good in the javelin event, but the

squad was too short in depth to be a definite threat in a relay meet, but in a duel meet they have proved their power in the Eugene Roseburg-Klamath meet.

The three way meet held at the first of the season went to Klamath as the Pelicans beat the two valley teams 57-47-47.

Jackson Challenges Rocky

NEW YORK — (AP) — Tommy Jackson left Dan "Buccerotti" seriously dead on his feet to become the third ranking challenger of Rocky Marciano.

This after no more than 21 months of legalized mayhem.

Hurricane Jackson, 22-year-old Negro out of Lockaway Beach, Long Island, via Georgia, heads an imposing list of young heavyweights. They're popping up around the country like McCarthy arguments. There are a dozen or more of them.

One of the brightest is Harold Garter, Linden, N.J., high school boy fighting main events in Newark.

Carter, former national Golden Gloves light-heavyweight, is unbeaten in seven starts as a professional, has five knockouts. He packs an authoritative wallop, takes one and pugilistic pundits like the way he moves. He isn't being fed set-ups. He had Joe Lindsay on the deck, where Jackson failed to put him in two outings. He twice knocked out Ike Thomas, who similarly disposed of Charlie Norkus.

Pat McMurry, Marine veteran of Korea, has Tacoma fans excited with five kayoes in a row, could be the most formidable of the lot.

Bob Albright has attracted attention in Los Angeles the past six months, had it out with Jake Williams, another prospect out of Pendleton, Oregon, the other night. Charley Powell, the 49er end, hasn't been discouraged in four bouts, and

The new heavyweight fever is Gorilla Jones, is guiding Charley Welch, who had Kayo Christner and Powell, the erstwhile 49er. Hutch Hutchinson, who managed Jack Silvers, a Grade A lightweight out of San Francisco, in the early 1940s, is campaigning out of Portland, Oregon, with Jimmy Byrne, who has four knockouts.

"Byrne is the son of Jimmy Byrne, who did a spot of pretty fair heavyweighing in the late '20s," writes Hutchinson. "He stands six two-and-a-half, came down from 265-pound tackle to 220. He was sluggish and had his jaw broken in football, which convinced him that boxing couldn't be so tough. An Army vet out of Owensboro, Kentucky, he is an expert rifleman and champion handball player."
