New Pine Creek

Now—wouldn't that be something? Signs point to bigger things for the NPC Rural Fire Protection District. In spite of its impoverished financial circumstances, it might even have a new fire hall—proving the old adage, "Wherever there's a will—there's a way!"

Impetus toward this realization was touched off by the generous donation of a lot for this express purpose by Mrs. Faye Keller Rose. She is desirous to see a new building go up on the lot large enough to house two vehicles—a fire truck and a tanker.

With the first hurdle cleared by the acquisition of a lot, members of the district fire board were invited to a joint meeting with members of the local volunteer fire department. The meeting was held at the home of Fire Chief Clarence McClain.

The enthusiastic group were all of one accord on these important points:

1. It is imperative that the district have a fire hall large enough to accommodate a fire truck and tanker, and provide a meeting place for the firemen;
2. That, even though the district is financially handicapped until its fire truck is fully paid for, it would be unwise and unfair at this time to increase the present 4 mill tax levy upon the taxpayers of the district, to raise the necessary capital; therefore—
3. It becomes necessary to construct a fire hall through means of direct contribution of money, donation of labor and by the giving of a series of money raising events of some nature that have the triple-fold purpose of raising funds, of developing interest in the fire department and providing community social life;
4. That the building shall be constructed of pumice brick with inside measurements of at least 24 x 50 feet.

Not long ago the NPC fire district board was quite excited by a sudden windfall. The Kelly Creek school board found to their disappointment that they could not use the Cogswell District school building which had been given to them by that district when the latter voted to be included into the Lakeview district. So the Kelly Creek board said to the fire district

board, "You can have the old Crane Creek schoolhouse for a fire hall." For just one dollar—just like that—we thought we had a fire hall.

But upon investigation it was found that the moving of the said school building would involve almost as much or more expense than to purchase material for a new pumice brick building. We still would not have a freeze-proof building nor one best suited to our needs even after a great deal more work of remodeling it had been done.

The fire district now has hopes of selling the Crane Creek building to the highest bidder and then using the proceeds toward the construction of a fire hall. Neil Elliott will be in charge of this transaction and anyone in the district who is interested in it should contact him. Disposition of same will be done in the regular business-like manner.
