AMONG THE ROSES

Anyone who loves roses can grow them in Klamath County. Many people, and for years, myself included, just could not associate the variable weather of this great wonderful country with the growing of this, the world's most popular and probably one of its oldest flowers.

Because of its delicate beauty we think of it as a tender, temperamental plant, that will turn up its toes at the least little thing. That's where we make our first mistake and start coddling it and giving it so much attention we just overdo it. When reality has been proved to be (at least for me) one of the toughest plants in my garden.

All it needs is a place in the sun. Some shade won't bother. As a matter of fact, a little protection from the afternoon heat will be beneficial. This shade should be furnished by a building rather than trees because of competition from tree roots. Roses should have at least six hours of sun a day, preferably the early morning hours.

ALL SOILS GOOD
Any good soil that will grow spruce, garden stuff or even grass and weeds, will grow a rose. As for bloom, types are available on the market now, to produce flowers from late May through to the hard freezes in the fall. The earliness of the blooming time here, will depend of course on the spring frosts. But no matter how many times the new young shoots freeze back the plant will send out more new shoots to bloom later.

Most died in the wool "rosarians" will have by this time of the year, completed their rose planting. They will have received from a reliable nursery, first grade bare-root plants and gotten them into the ground as soon as possible. If it is impossible to plant at once the wrapping should be removed and the plants heeled into the ground by digging a trench and laying in the bushes at an angle, working the soil well around the roots and watering them well. They should not be left any longer this way than necessary. If it's cold a few weeks won't hurt but with the weather warm the way it has been this spring they are apt to start growing after a week or two. Moving them then is bad for them. They can even be held for a short time left in the wrappings they came in and stored in a cool place and kept moist.

BUY GOOD BUSHES
The best authorities on rose growing tell us that a bargain rose bush is more apt to be a disappointment than a success. How right they are. However there are bargains and bargains. There is a difference between a plant that has lain around in a package in a warm store for weeks and a bundle of the smaller plants that can be gotten from a nursery in a good live state and planted at once.

Usually it is recommended that a new rose be planted without the assistance of a generous dose of fertilizer, unless the soil is so poor that it is doubtful it will do good. In this case use some well rotted cow manure in the bottom of the hole with at least three inches of clean dirt for the roots to come in contact with. Water is more essential at this stage of the game and good drainage is a "must." Most folks are familiar with the method of planting. Dig a generous hole about a foot or more deep and 18 or so inches across with loose soil piled up a little in the bottom so the roots will come in contact with the soil without leaving airholes. Fill the hole about

half full and see that the joint where the graft is, will be about two inches below the level of the soil when the bush finally comes out of hibernation, and is growing as it should. Personally I do not favor tramping in the plant at this stage. I let the water do the settling in for me. I work the first soil around the roots well with my fingers and fill the holes with water, letting the plants set until the water soaks away. Then I finish filling the hole and bank dirt up around the plant as far as possible to keep the tops from drying out or freezing from doing too much damage. As soon as the plants begin to sprout and before the sprouts are more than a half inch long, this piled up soil should gradually be removed, preferably with a gentle stream of water or by hand.
