TODAY'S WOMEN

Common sense and frank discussion have done much to rehabilitate the lives of today's unwed mothers, says Sara B. Edlin, for 40 years director of a home for these one-time outcasts of society.

A kindly, bright-eyed little woman with a vast understanding of human problems, Mrs. Edlin has set down her findings in a new book, "The Unmarried Mother in Our Society," soon to be published. Discussing in an interview the changes both in public attitude and in the character of the girls themselves over the years of her long tenure, Mrs. Edlin says:

"When I first arrived to take over management of the Lakeview Home in Sten Island in 1914, most of the expectant mothers there were young immigrant girls who had come over from the old country to seek jobs in New York.

"Today we have girls from all strata of society, from wealthy and upper-class homes as well as from poverty-stricken families. So we cannot place the blame for their plight on either ignorance or poverty. Most of the girls have had the advantage of sex education in the schools, many have excellent backgrounds and college educations.

"I have come to the firm conclusion that in almost every case the misfortune of these girls is caused by a faulty relationship with their parents. In some instances the girls feel they have been slighted for a more attractive or more gifted brother or sister. In some cases they resent parental discipline and feel that the rules laid down by their mothers and

fathers are old-fashioned.

"It seems to be a spirit of defiance against their parents that has driven practically every one of them to her present state."

Most of today's unmarried mothers do not keep their babies, says Mrs. Edlin, and under the present social structure in this country she believes this is best for the future of both mother and child. She explains:

"It is still difficult for an unmarried mother to return to her place in society with her child, and gain anything like a normal life for either of them.

"If the child is offered for adoption, it grows up in a normal family structure and has an even chance with other children. Also the mother, without the child, usually marries and establishes a new life for herself."

It is unusual for today's unwed mother to marry the father of her child, says Mrs. Edlin. Often she doesn't want to marry him, even if he is willing.
