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Cow Palace Show Success

From every standpoint and in every division, the 1954 Grand National Junior Livestock Exposition at the San Francisco Cow Palace was an outstanding success, according to J. W. Mailliard III, chairman of the show.

Highlights of Mailliard's report on the Junior Grand National, nation's largest livestock exposition devoted exclusively to 4-H and Future Farmer members which closed a six day presentation April 15, were:

1. This year's entry list of 1,255 farm boys and girls and 3,454 livestock and dairy animals was the second largest in the eight year history of the show, being topped only slightly by the record year of 1952.

2. In the face of unsettled livestock market conditions due to the changeover from a wartime to a peacetime economy, prices paid by public spirited buyers in the three auctions were highly satisfactory.

3. Public attendance at the three arena entertainment show performances this year was substantially higher than for four performances in 1953, thus indicating a growing interest by city dwellers in the agricultural economy of the Far West.

4. The show was a financial success.
