**THEN ...**

 When Edwin Abbott (Taxi) Thomas, city engineer and oldest employe in point of service on the Klamath Falls municipal payroll, started his career, his chief ambition was to see all the world. If it hadn't been for his old friend, City Attorney Henry Perkins, he might have achieved this ambition. Perkins convinced him in 1926 that "rolling stones gather no moss" and he had better settle down in Klamath Falls.

Thomas really took the city attorney's settling down advice to heart. In the past 28 years he hasn't skirted out of town, except on a few short vacations.

Taxi Thomas first saw the light of day in Denver, Colorado, on July 22, 1894. He attended the public schools in Denver and was graduated from the University of Colorado with an engineering degree.

It was in Boulder, Colorado, where Thomas won the sobriquet "Taxi." Old schoolmates say in those days he was a gay and high-rolling blade with the motto — "first class or I don't ride."

As a free spender and a guy who liked to put on the dog, in his senior year at the university he was also known as quite a hand with the ladies. One evening he pulled up in front of a sorority house with a four-horse automobile and a liveried chauffeur. He was going to take his girl to a party in style. After he handed her into the vehicle with a flourish, he was startled to learn that the party they were to attend was being staged only a block away. Thomas has since been known as "Taxi."

About the time Thomas wound up his university career, the United States started making the world safe for democracy. He volunteered for army duty and went overseas with the 60th engineers. He saw service in France, Germany and Italy.

After his return to the United States, he decided to try his luck in the oil fields at Casper, Wyoming. He remained there until a slump hit the industry in 1923. Then he headed west. In Klamath Falls, Thomas met an old Casper friend, Henry Perkins, who had just hung out his shingle and was practicing law.

"Henry convinced me this was the place to grow up with," Thomas said. "I've been here ever since."

Thomas' first Klamath Falls job was as an assistant in the city engineer's office. He became city engineer in 1930 and has held the job ever since.

# Tulelake To Grow Garlic

TULELAKE — A relatively new crop which is being tried on a little larger scale in the Tulelake Basin this year is garlic, according to Burt Hoyle, Tulelake Field Station.

Although this is not an absolutely new crop for this area, market conditions today may be more favorable towards production than when it was produced successfully here several years ago.

It is generally known that garlic does not produce true seed, and therefore, the bulb is divided into single cloves and these cloves are planted, usually by hand.

The Tulelake Field Station is including among its projects this year a small experimental plot and will attempt to make late garlic mature early.

It has been discovered by Dr. Louis Mann, Division of Vegetable Crops, University of California, that garlic stored at certain constant temperatures will mature at different times. This will be tried along with testing the bulbs in storage at different temperatures. The first planting of this garlic was on April 1, and already there is a difference in the growth of the first lots.

As a matter of interest one row of garlic was planted with all of the cloves up-side-down. The adjacent row was planted right-side-up. Anyone interested in observing the garlic planted this way is invited to visit the station at their convenience. Also of interest is some garlic which was planted last November.

"You can't count out 3D," says Goldstein. "It may do poorly in one town, but sensationally in another. Exhibitors who don't want to bother with the glasses can just run the picture in 2D."

Goldstein runs today's liveliest independent film company. Having turned out a dozen film for 20th Century-Fox release, he now is dickering with a number of major distributors for future films. He is in a good position, since the theater men are howling about the film shortage.

He is also doing something about the talent shortage. "Somebody had better start building some new stars soon," he warns, "or the present ones will be too old." He has four promising newcomers in his stable: Cleo Moore, Lee Marvin, Jeffrey Stone and Lisa Daniels.

Frank Sinatra reports seeing the Judy Garland film, "A Star is Born," and says it is merely great. Although an admitted Garland Partisan, he says all the great scenes of the Janet Gaynor-Fredric March film are even better in the new version.

Two more star names join the free lance ranks. Janet Leigh and Miri Gaynor will be independents after the next pictures for their respective studios. Miss Leigh immediately signed picture deals with Columbia and Universal-Internation, and Miss Gaynor will embark on a lucrative night club tour.

# Japan Leader Faces Crisis

TOKYO — The Japanese House of Representatives late today defeated a no-confidence vote against the pro-American administration of Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida in a stormy debate climaxing the nation's greatest post-war political crisis.

The victory came when the House defeated by a 228-208 vote a no-confidence motion based mainly on domestic issues.

The virtually unprecedented victory marked the first time in the 79-year modern political history of Japan that a prime minister had fought and won against violent opposition, scandal and the almost-solid opposition of the press.

The decision came after more than a score of Progressives — Japan's second Conservative party — walked out of the House to give Yoshida's Liberal (conservative) party a majority.

The action followed a night and a day of feverish behind-the-scenes negotiations by the wily old premier.

# Airman Returns To Claim Medals

ST. LOUIS — Lt. (jg) Roland G. Busch Jr., 28, last night officially was awarded three medals which his parents had received when he was reported killed in action in Korea.

The medals — the Distinguished Flying Cross, a second Air Medal and Purple Heart — were taken from the officer's parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. G. Busch Sr., Cape Girardeau, Mo., and presented to the pilot.

Lt. Busch was reported killed in Korea in the crash of his plane in 1952. But he managed to drag himself from his plane before it exploded.

He was held prisoner in North Korea and Chinese prison camps 16 months. Busch, now assistant operations officer at the air station here, was the first Navy officer released by the Communists Aug. 30, 1953.
