

Weiser Whips Brown

Ralph Weiser punched and counterpunched his way to a unanimous ten round decision in the main event of last Saturday night's boxing card at the Armory, over Little Papa Brown.

The Beatty Bomber was never in serious trouble and only in a few rounds was there any doubtfulness as to how the fight would come out.

Little Papa was being beaten to the punch at most exchanges of blows, but still managed to land several punches that kept Weiser at bay.

In the fourth round, Weiser uncocked a hard right to Brown's head that sent the Seattle Negro to the canvas for a five count. That round Brown also slipped to his knees, but it was not because of Weiser's punches.

The sixth round seemed to be Brown's best as he started using his left jab to keep Weiser off balance, but Weiser was boxing too good for the Washington fighter to do much damage.

Weiser had Brown on the ropes at the end of round nine, but despite hard lefts and rights Little Papa managed to weather the storm.

After the fight in Weiser's dressing room, it was learned that the Indian pugilist had suffered an injury to his right hand in the third round. He thought that it would have been from a solid right to Brown's jaw in that round.

Darrell Harrington took a unanimous decision from Rudy Carlson in the six round semi-windup of an outstanding supporting card.

Harrington opened the fight quick and held the margin throughout the fight. In the fight, Harrington caught Carlson in the corner and landed a flurry of punches before Carlson could escape into the center of the ring.

Ted Hall took a fourth round knockout win over Bonanza's George Bray in their scheduled six rounder.

Hall seemed to have an experience edge on Bray, and moved in on the Bonanza fighter with a series of blows sent the local boxer to the floor. Bray tried to get up at the count of eight but fell back to his face as Referee Wally Moss counted ten.

In a four rounder, Sprague River's Bob Barney took a second round TKO from Al Cobb, of Beatty, when Cobb's manager, Bob Wark decided against further injury to his fighter's eye, which had been cut seriously in the first round.

Referee Moss, Dr. George Adler, of the boxing commission, and Wark looked at the eye and all thought that for Cobb's safety the fight should be stopped.

Duane McDaniels took a four round unanimous decision from Plumi Wright in what could have been the lightweight championship fight of Chillicothe, as that is where both boys make their home.

The promoter, Young Roy Drake, of Tulelake, scored a third round TKO over Lonnie Swisher. Drake was dishing out plenty of punches when Moss stopped the bout in one minute twenty five seconds of the round.

The Armory fight got more than they bargained for as a fight at outside between spectators developed between the Cobb-Barney and the Hall-Bray matches. Armory officials broke up the extra-curricular activities before any damage was done.

Promoter Mack Lillard announced that Jimmy Byrne of Portland heavy-weight will be back in town on May 7 to meet one of the most outstanding fighters that has ever been in Klamath Falls.

Lillard has lined up Big Andy Walker of San Francisco, to meet the tough Portland heavy-weight in a ten round main event.

This fight was scheduled for Portland last Thursday but due to promotional problems it was dropped.

Giant's Pitching Talk of Majors

Baseball fans were still buzzing today over the three successive shutouts turned in by the New York Giants' Marv Grissom, Sal Maglie and Johnny Antonelli over the Philadelphia Phils Saturday and Sunday.

This brilliant back-to-back pitching has all but overshadowed the remarkable resurgence of the Chicago White Sox, who in one week leap-frogged from last to first place in the American League with seven victories in eight games.

Following up Grissom's 1-0 three-hit squeaker over Robin Roberts Saturday, Maglie and Antonelli limited the feeble Phils to five and three hits, respectively, yesterday as the Giants swept the doubleheader 3-0 and 5-0. In 27 straight scoreless innings, the Phils accumulated only 11 hits, 10 of them singles.

TWIN BILL

The White Sox made it three in a row over Baltimore, coming from behind each time to capture both ends of a twin bill 4-3 and 3-2. The double victory boosted the Sox into a half-game lead over Detroit's Tigers, who fell into a second-place tie, losing a 10-9 overtime decision to Cleveland.

Washington broke loose with five runs in the eighth inning to overcome the Boston Red Sox 5-1.

New York's defending champion Yankees dropped into a fourth-place tie with Philadelphia when the A's whipped them 4-2 after the Yankees had taken the first game 6-1. The nightcap was called after eight innings because of Pennsylvania's curfew law.

The Brooklyn Dodgers retained their half-game advantage in the National League. They defeated Pittsburgh 4-2 after the Pirates

had rebelled Don Newcombe off the mound in the first inning and overwhelmed the Dodgers 9-3 in the opener.

Cincinnati clung to second place by edging out Chicago 3-2. The Cubs had slugged the Redlegs into a 9-2 defeat in the first game. The St. Louis Cardinals finally climbed into the 500 circle by nipping the Milwaukee Braves 7-6 in 12 innings to even their record at five wins and five losses.

BIRTHDAY

Maglie, 37 years old today, celebrated his birthday a day early when he outpitched Curt Simmons for his third straight triumph. A double by Dave Williams and Don Mueller's single broke a scoreless duel in the seventh. Two-run homers by Monie Irvin and Hank Thompson helped Antonelli gain the nod over Murry Dickson in the nightcap.

Virgil Trucks spotted the Orioles two runs in the first inning then blanked them with four hits the rest of the way to gain his second White Sox win. Ferris Fain's bases-loaded single climaxed a two-run rally in the ninth inning to give Chicago its second-game victory.

Dave Philley, who had made but one hit in 27 times at bat, homered in the 10th with a man on base for Cleveland to snap an 8-8 tie. The Tigers got a run in their half of the 10th but Early Wynn replaced winner Don Mossi and disposed of the last batter with the tying and winning runs on the bases. Outfielder Wally Westlake's two homers kept the Indians in the running.

HIGHLIGHTED

Three ex-Red Sox players figured prominently in Washington's victory over Boston. Run-scoring singles by Cy, Jerry Coleman and Mel Hoderlein highlighted the Nats' five-run eighth. Southpaw Chuck Stobbs, who broke in with the Red Sox, held his former mates to seven hits for his first victory.

Jim McDonald, aided by Johnny Sain, turned back the A's easily after homers by Jerry Coleman, Phil Rizzuto and rookie Bill Skowron had given him a comfortable lead. The A's evened the score in the nightcap, snapping a 2-2 tie in the sixth. Don Bollweg and Bill Renna, sent by the Yanks to the seventh, Vernon Law went the distance in the winning runs off loser Bob Grim.

After Frank Thomas' three-run homer had kayoted Newcombe in the first inning, rookie Curt Roberson insured Pittsburgh's victory with a bases-loaded double in the seventh. Vernon Law went the distance in the winning runs off loser Bob Grim.

Rookie Art Fowler became the first Cincinnati pitcher to hurl a complete game this season when he defeated the Cubs in the second game after Chicago had clubbed three Redleg pitchers for 14 hits, including home runs by Ralph Kiner and Randy Jackson, in the opener.

Jim Pendleton's muf of Red Schoendienst's bases-loaded fly with two out in the 12th allowed Alex Grammas to score the winning run that gave the Cards their 7-6 victory over the Braves. Milwaukee had tied the score in the ninth when Eddie Mathews clubbed a two-run homer, his fourth of the season.

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — A cool disposition, an antiquated nifty shaft putter and a baseball grip were major factors in the victory of Art Wall Jr., in the \$35,000 Tournament of Champions.

The 30-year-old native Pennsylvanian from Pocono Manor Monday could stow \$10,000 into the bank for the triumph over 18 other selected players in the second annual champions' tournament.

Brilliant rounds of 69, 66 and 70, followed by a cautious 1-over par 73 Sunday, brought Wall in safely by six strokes over his nearest rival, including Sam Snead, Lloyd Mangrum, Gary Middlecoff.

Mangrum held on to gain a tie for second place with last year's surprise longshot winner, Al Bessellink—Mangrum with a 71 and Bessellink a 68 for 284. Each won \$3,750.

Snead finished far back with a last round 72 for a 291. He could merely pick up the \$1,000 check guaranteed each golfer who participated. Just ahead at 289 were Gene Littler, who took his second straight 76 and Dave Douglas, with a 71.

The injury-riddled San Diego Padres headed for Portland and their next Pacific Coast League stand Monday, happy to see the last of a Seattle team that was just as glad to see them go.

The Padres won the series at Seattle 4-1 after dividing a marathon doubleheader Sunday, but injuries cost them the services of two key players. Seattle also sidelined three men after mishaps in the field Sunday and a wild melee Saturday.

San Diego will play seven games at Portland starting Tuesday, while the Sacramento Solons, who dropped the series with the Beavers 3-4, travel to Seattle.

The Padres and Seattle split Sunday's twin bill, the Rainiers winning the 14 inning first game 2-2 and dropping the nightcap 9-6. Oakland climbed into the top spot after dividing with San Francisco 15-1 and 5-4, while Los Angeles climbed into the fourth spot behind Portland by whipping Hollywood 8-1 and 5-3. Sacramento beat Portland 4-3 but lost 8-5.

San Diego and Seattle battled through 7 hours and 11 minutes. Seattle won the first game as Artie Wilson scored in the 14th. Wilson, with five singles in seven trips scored each of the three Rainier runs.

For more names were added to the casualty list in the two games. Injured were San Diego's Earl Rapp and Seattle's Jack Tobin, Bob Weiland, and George Schmees. Rapp sprained an ankle. Weiland and Tobin were knocked unconscious when they collided going after a fly ball. Schmees was kayoted when he hit the outfield fence.

Lost to the Padres on Saturday was catcher Red Mathis who broke a wrist in a wild fight at first. Emergency surgery was performed with bone grafted to the shattered radius in his wrist. Doctors said he's out for the season and perhaps his baseball career is at an end.

Sacramento put together four runs on four hits and a Portland error to win their opening game. In the finale, Portland went into the lead in the bottom of the first and held it out for the season and perhaps his baseball career is at an end.
