Korean Orphans Aided By Gifts From Chiloquin

CHILOQUIN—The heart warming story of 120 Korean orphans, who have been helped by local people through gifts of clothing, has come in the form of a letter from Capt. Phil W. DeLano, a jet pilot in Korea from Oakland, and a brother of Mrs. Paul Herron, Chiloquin.

Mrs. Herron told a few months ago of a small orphanage her brother and his squadron were sponsoring. He asked that his sister spread the story and get folks to donate clothing to send to him. He in turn gave the packages to his chaplain and they were turned over to the nine elderly Korean people who are running the ramshackle buildings housing 120 little homeless youngsters.

Capt. DeLano writes that the children are living in conditions unimaginable to us in Oregon, that even many of the basic necessities are missing. The leaders are trying desperately to build the place into a self-sustaining unit and to that end have obtained a small pear orchard and a few small animals. Greening Of Spuds Told

A surprisingly high percentage of light greened potatoes after only seven days display in retail stores, is reported as the result of a study of Katahdin and Green Mountain potatoes, according to County Extension Agent Wail Jodrajewski.

Light greening was studied in potatoes packed in polyethylene, mesh, kraft window and solid kraft consumer bags.

Greening developed in proportion to the amount of visibility year. CARE and the Korean government both give limited assistance, but most of the responsibility for the camp has been taken over by the Marines. that a package provided being highest in polyethylene bags, intermediate in kraft bags with mesh windows and least in solid kraft paper bags.

After a seven day retail store display under 10 to 20 foot candle light for nine hours daily, percentage of light greened Katahdin potatoes was: 32.2 per cent for tied-top polyethylene; 38.9 per cent for elastic top polyethylene; 18 per cent for paper mesh with paper band; 10.6 per cent for kraft with mesh window and 0 to .2 per cent for kraft paper. However, greening recorded for the Katahdin variety in this test was not rated as severe.

Green Mountain potatoes were subjected to a similar test. Bags were displayed under 30 to 60 foot candle light for nine hours daily over a seven day period. Percentage of light greened Green Mountain was: 55.4 per cent for tied-

top polyethylene; 55.4 per cent for elastic top polyethylene; 40.1 per cent for paper mesh with paper band; 15.0 per cent for kraft with mesh window and 0 to 1.0 per cent for kraft paper.

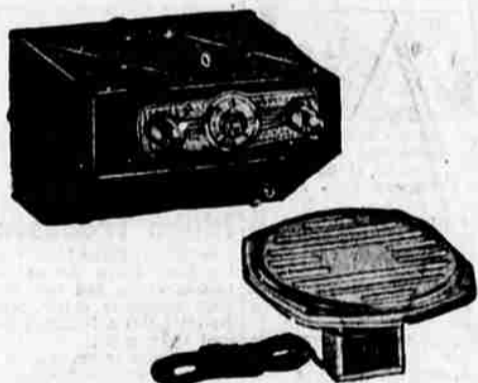

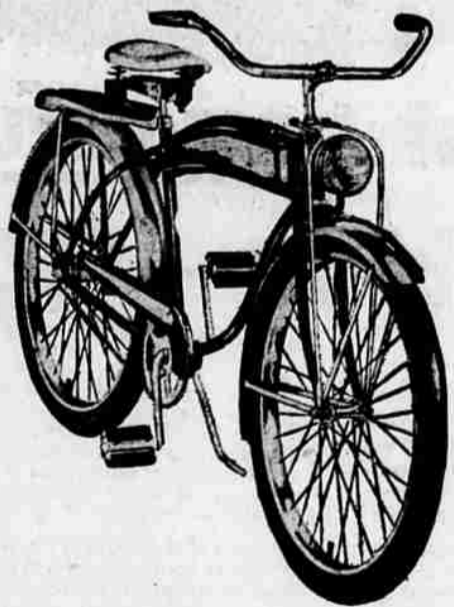

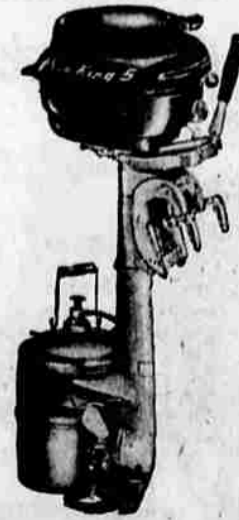
