

MARKETS AND FINANCE

WALL STREET NEW YORK (AP) - The stock market raced ahead Friday with a vigorous show of strength, but it faltered in late trading under profit-taking. The forward drive sent the market on into new high ground for the past 24 years for the second straight day. Gains went to around 2 points at the outside with a few issues pushing higher than that from time to time. Volume amounted to an estimated 2,400,000 shares. That compares with Thursday's 2,510,000 shares, second highest total of the year.

Honduras Vote Shuns England

BELIZE, British Honduras (AP) - The independence-seeking People's United Party (PUP) celebrated jubilantly today its sweeping victory in this British Central American colony's first full-scale general elections. The anti-British PUP won eight of the nine elective seats in a new 15-man Legislative Council set up by the government in a move toward giving the colony's 76,000 inhabitants greater self-rule. Only in remote Toledo province - last to report - did the PUP suffer a setback. Charles Westby, candidate of the Independent party favoring continued close ties to Britain, won over PUP candidate George Gardiner 451-394. British colonial authorities considered remarkable the fact that 14,463 of the nearly 21,000 registered men and women over 21 cast ballots in this first general election. Some voters in isolated places had to paddle miles in canoes to polling stations. Colonial authorities promised to cooperate fully with the elected legislators, who will be sworn in for three-year terms, probably in June. Instead of appointing half of the council as in the past, a British governor, Sir Patrick M. Renison, will name only three to the council. Three other seats will be filled by government officials. The PUP platform demanded independence from the British and also ruled out ties with neighboring Guatemala, which for years has claimed it is the rightful owner of British Honduras. PUP leaders denied a government charge that the party had connections with Guatemala's leftist government.

Court To Rule On Roosevelt

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) - Whether James Roosevelt can amend his separate maintenance suit to one for divorce was the key question in a Superior Court hearing today. Also up for decision was his motion to strike from the record his sensational infidelities letter dated Feb. 27, 1945, in which he named nine women with whom - according to the letter - he was intimate. Last Jan. 18 Roosevelt, who is running for Congress, filed suit for separate maintenance, charging extreme cruelty. Nine days later his estranged wife Romelle filed a separate maintenance suit, alleging cruelty and adultery. She named three co-respondents. Roosevelt has denied any misconduct and said he was black-mailed into signing the 1945 letter to prevent a divorce. On April 19 the eldest son of the late President Roosevelt offered his wife a divorce and half his property and net income. Mrs. Roosevelt, who is receiving \$1,625 a month temporary support under court order, denounced the offer as a "publicity stunt." Her counsel is opposing the divorce move and the motion to strike the infidelities letter and another one written the same day are linked and form a binding contract. In the other letter Roosevelt offered his wife in effect half his property and earnings for the rest of his life.

Soybeans also retreated on the late selling drive after the old crop had scored gains of about 5 cents earlier. Winter Wheat Estimate Told

TULELAKE - The April 1 estimate by the Agriculture Marketing Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture indicates that the winter wheat crop will be down nearly twenty five per cent from 1953, making the estimated yield 678 million bushels, reports Ken Baghott, Tulelake farm adviser. Baghott reports that drought has cut the crop sharply in the Great Plains since December 1, but conditions have improved in most other areas. The first estimate of spring wheat production will be issued June 10.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - Mme. Chiang Kai-shek, 56, entered Franklin Hospital today for treatment of a recurring skin ailment, traced to an allergy when she was treated for it here in 1952.
