The accident happened when a group of men were attempting to remove the stump of a large tree blown down last winter during a high wind at the Ross Banister home. A cable broke and let the heavy boom fall on Huston's head. At the hospital it was stated he had suffered no fractures but had a badly twisted spine. The fact that Huston was wearing his safety hat at the time probably saved his life.
