Medical Firm Describes Germ Finding Technique

PITTSBURGH, Pa.—A new "invisible light" technique for quickly identifying germs known to be resistant to certain drugs was described today to the Society of American Bacteriologists.

A team of researchers of the CIBA Pharmaceutical Co. of Summit, N. J., told about it at the SAB's 54th general meeting.

And some doctors who studied the report declared that the advantage of the technique, if developed for general use, would lie in this:

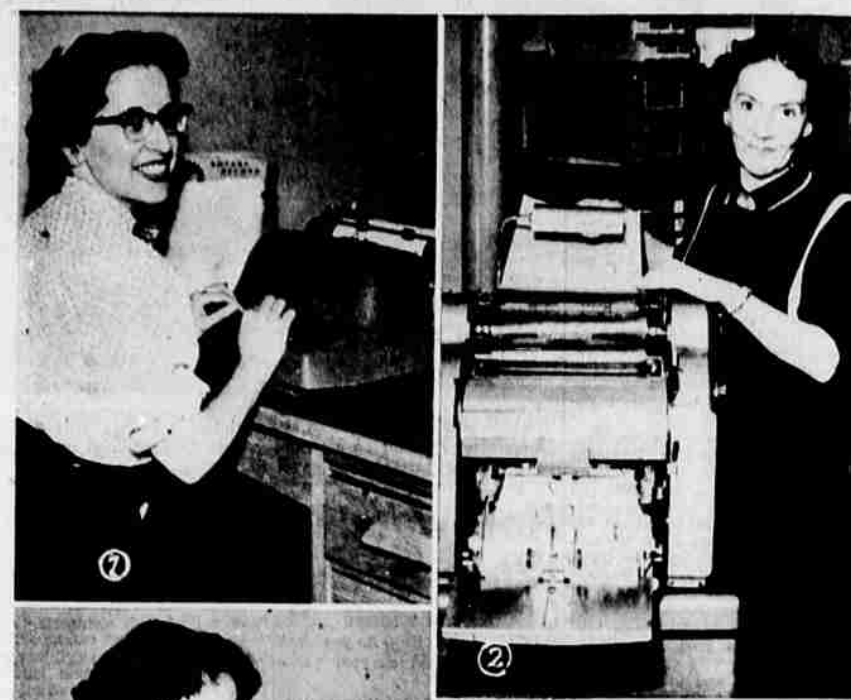
It might allow a doctor to eliminate certain drugs from the very start in treating a patient—and to concentrate on other methods of treatment that might have a chance of effectiveness.

The CIBA investigators—researchers F. C. Kulland M. R. Grimm—reported they had noted detectable differences in the way different strains within given families of germs react to infrared "invisible" light.

Strains known to be resistant to certain of the antibiotic "wonder drugs" or to the new antitubercular drugs absorbed the light to a different degree than did strains known to be sensitive to such drugs.

The researchers said that while the technique offered a means of quickly determining that a given germ had at least some resistance or susceptibility to a given drug, it has not yet been developed to the point of showing the exact degree of resistance or susceptibility.

Returned Doctor Reports On Chinese Communism

WORCESTER, Mass. (P)—A physician who was held in China for 18 months under "town arrest" says, "Not more than 5 per cent of the Chinese people have any use for the Communist government or any confidence in the party."

He forecasts an ultimate uprising.

Dr. William E. Bralsted, graduate of Brown University and McGill University Medical School, went to China first in 1938 for the American Baptist Foreign Missionary Society. He operated a hospital at Kityang, Kwangtung province, in south China. Part of the time it was under control of the Communists.

He believes "it is only a matter of time before the end will be seen in a mass uprising."

He says the only loyal Communists are party officers, members of the military and "stooges."

"And even they," he adds, "are far from 100 per cent loyal."

Dr. Bralsted made his comment while here to address the Lincoln Square Baptist Church, which raised funds in 1946 to build a wing for his hospital.

"The mass of people," he says, "are totally disillusioned by the failure of the new government to fulfill promises of better administration. They are deeply resentful of the oppression of the new rulers."

"And they are particularly full of resentment for the murder of many of their best citizens."

"The people are more miserable than before with less food, higher taxes and the loss of all freedoms and security."

"This fits a familiar historical pattern and I believe it is only a matter of time before the end will be seen in a mass uprising."

Dr. Bralsted found some lack of enthusiasm for Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek among Chinese with whom he talked.

He questioned Chinese regarding the generalissimo. He says their reply was: "We didn't like those mice that were eating up our grain a while ago; but we like these rats even less."

Living conditions — hard for the average farmer — under Chiang's regime — are now sheer misery, Dr. Bralsted says.

He says the Communist government's preoccupation with political control has caused deterioration of services such as that which his hospital performed.

He describes his institution of 70 beds, 5 doctors, 23 graduate nurses and 60 student nurses as the only good medical institution in a country of a million inhabitants but, nevertheless "totally inadequate."

Under the Communists, he says its efficiency has greatly decreased.
