

Musial Sets New Mark

'The Man' Clouts 5 Homers

Now you know why they call Stan Musial the Man. No other hitter in major league history ever hit five home runs in one day.

Only nine days ago Musial was bumping along at .250, gripped by the same slump that tortured him last spring. Now he is hitting .400 with eight homers and seven doubles among his 24 hits. The \$80,000-salaried St. Louis Cardinal outfielder leads the majors with 21 runs batted in and shares the home run lead with Chicago's Hank Bauer.

The six-time batting champion of the National League "slumped" to .337 last year, a low point below his .345 lifetime batting average. As late as mid-June he was struggling at the .250 mark.

"All I need is one of those four-for-four days," he said then.

He got his four for four yesterday in the first game, three home runs and a single off New York Giant pitching. Then he added two more homers in the second game.

Six men had hit four homers in a doubleheader but Musial never had hit three. Five men had hit five homers in two consecutive games, but not on the same day.

So Sunday, May 2, 1954, will go down in the books as Musial Day in St. Louis, the day Stan hit three stop the right field pavilion and two over the roof, bouncing across Grand Avenue.

TRAM MAN

Musial's clubhouse comment was typical of a team man: "You can't smile too much when you lose a ball game." For the Cards did lose that second game 9-7 after taking the opener 10-6.

A total of 32 home runs were hit in the two games at Busch Stadium and 21 in all in the National League, four short of the record set July 16, 1950.

Musial's shiny day had no appreciable effect on the league race. The Philadelphia Phillies gained a 4-3 edge over Cincinnati in the first half of a doubleheader. The second game was washed out. The Cardinals' effective relief pitching and Del Ennis' home run saved the day for the Phils.

Chicago and Pittsburgh also went on a homer spree with a total of eight, three by Hank Sauer, and they split a pair. A Sauer homer and single gave Paul Minner a 6-3 first-game decision over Vern Riffe. The Pirates ripped into the Cubs for eight runs in the first inning of the second game on the way to an 18-10 decision. Darkness mercifully put an end to the slaughter at the end of eight innings after six home runs had been hit, two more by Sauer.

RAINED OUT

Brooklyn's game at Milwaukee was rained out. The American League also had a postponement, the Baltimore at Boston doubleheader.

Cleveland gained ground on everybody in the American, winning a pair from Washington 6-0 and 6-3 in 10 innings. Chicago won its third straight about 4-0 at Philadelphia. Don Johnson throwing a two-hitter but the White Sox lost the second game 2-1 on Elmer Valo's pinch single in the ninth, his first hit of the season. The New York Yankees broke loose with their biggest inning, six runs in the third, to smother Detroit 12-4. Then they shut out Detroit with one hit by Bill Hoft 4-0 in the second game, cut to five innings by darkness.

Getting back to Musial, his third homer in the first game came off Jim Hearn, with two on, breaking a 6-6 tie. The blow sent Hearn down to his second defeat and gave Al Brazie his first victory. Stan's first two came off Johnny Antonelli.

In the second game his pair came off Hoyt Wilhelm, who was struggling desperately to hold the lead the Giants piled up with eight in the fourth inning.

HOME RUNS

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TIME OUT



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The sprawling Western International League, faced with the problem of disposing of an "orphan" franchise, was told Monday it must find an answer in the next four days or reschedule and operate as a nine-team circuit.

President Robert B. Abel, who ordered surrender of the Calgary franchise last week, said unless a new owner is found by May 6 the "Calgary team will be disbanded and on May 7 the league will have nine teams."

Groups at Tacoma, Wash., which fielded a WIL team until three years ago, and Eugene, Ore., were reported interested in the franchise. The Pierce County Baseball Assn. scheduled a meeting at Tacoma Monday to discuss the possibility of rejoining the league.

Abel said a group at Eugene had talked of entering the loop, but he had heard nothing from Eugene recently "that could justify the statement anything worthwhile was developing."

"Whatever happens," Abel said, "the WIL will continue. There is no thought of stopping play."

Abel ordered the Calgary franchise surrendered last Thursday when, he said, the owners failed to provide expense money for the players as they opened the season at Kennewick, and then failed to "deposit money for a future guarantee of operations."

The players were brought directly under the league and ordered to play out the series at Kennewick, Salem and Spokane. The Spokane series ends Thursday night.

Calgary and Edmonton, Alta., were brought into the WIL last year, making it a ten-team circuit, the largest in organized baseball. Edmonton led the league in attendance while Calgary finished a poor tenth.

But since this year there was talk of this year that Calgary might not field a team in 1954. Manager Gene Lillard obtained the promise of financial backing, however, and collected and trained a team in California.

Surrender of the Calgary franchise left the status of Edmonton, the league's farthest north team, uncertain. Abel indicated it was "too early" to determine how Edmonton's operations would be affected.

With Calgary gone, teams will be faced with a jump of some 700 miles from Spokane or Vancouver to Edmonton.

Meanwhile, Salem is ruling the WIL roost with five straight wins without a loss. The Senators took three in a row from Calgary over the weekend, winning 12-1 Saturday, and 5-4 and 4-3 in 11 and 8 innings, respectively, Sunday.

Lewiston, Yakima and Spokane were bunched two games back of the Senators.

Spokane won from Lewiston 6-5 in 10 innings Saturday and divided Sunday 9-7, and 15-8. Yakima downed Vancouver 10-2 Saturday and also split Sunday, winning 6-5 after dropping the opener 12-5.

Edmonton, after losing 7-6 to Tri-City Saturday, came back Sunday to sweep a double bill 6-0, 6-1. Wenatchee also took both ends of a Sunday doubleheader, downing Victoria 6-5, 6-1.

Oregon Tech's Owl baseball team is waiting for tomorrow afternoon's doubleheader with the Southern Oregon Red Raiders, after dumping Lassen Junior College three times over the weekend.

In Saturday's game the Tech squad was outbatted by the Lassen nine, but managed to score a 10-4 win over the home town team. In the Sunday doubleheader the Mile High Campus crew turned in 21-2 and 9-0 wins.

Lassen, according to Owl Coach Art Kirkland, was a greatly improved ball club from the one that lost three games to the OTI team one week ago, and permitted the Owls to score 96 runs in three games.

In the first game, Oregon Tech was limited to one extra base blow, that a double by Gary Dorn in the fifth inning.

The Owls scored twice in the first and then countered for five more runs in the second frame to sew up the Saturday encounter.

Ray Carrow went the distance for the Techs and gained his first win of the season against three losses. Lew Emerson and Dorn led the Owl hitters with two safeties in three and four times at bat respectively.

In the first game Sunday, Dorn and Don Vest paced the Owls to the lopsided win over the home town team. Dorn pounded out three hits in four times at the plate and Vest collected two blows in four trips.

Don Wright collected the win to send his win record to a respectable 4-1 for the season. The lefthander struck out 13 Lassen hitters in posting the victory.

Arvey Nelson, the other stylish southpaw that the Owls have in their squad, threw a three hit shutout at the Lassen nine in the nightcap of Sunday's doubleheader.

Nelson struckout 14 and walked only two during his seven inning stint on the mound.

OTI hitters were led by Lee Oliver and Warren Osborne in the game. Oliver batted out two hits in two official times at bat, and Osborne hit safely twice in three at bats at the plate.

The three wins brought Oregon Tech's season record to 11 wins and 4 losses, two of which have been delf to them by the SOC Raiders.

Tomorrow afternoon's game should prove to test the Owls a little bit more than the Lassen contest.

In four outings with the Ashland school the Tech nine has won two and lost two. All of the games have been very close, and tomorrow's will probably be the same.

Kirkland announced that he would probably send his lefthander, Nelson and Wright against the Red Raiders, and have Big Ray Carrow and Glen Marcum ready if he needs their help against the invaders from the valley.

Game time for the first half of the afternoon doubleheader is 1:30 at the Recreation Field diamond.

Byrne Returns To Armory

Jarrin' Jimmy Byrne and San Francisco's Andy Walker will meet in a ten round main event on Friday night's boxing card at the Armory.

Byrne has appeared in the local spotlight twice before, and has demonstrated plenty of class for the short time that he had an opponent.

In his first battle, he knocked out Al Winn, of Vallejo, California, in the second round, and in the second showing he hung a TKO win over Roger Smith, when the Frisco Negro suffered a bad cut over his left eye, this also was in the second round.

Byrne, who is due in Klamath Falls sometime early this week has been staging hard workouts in Seattle, Eddie Cotton, one of the nation's top light-heavyweights, who holds wins over several top heavyweights in the country, has been working as the Portland fighter's sparring partner the past couple of weeks.

Walker, is one of the largest, if not the largest names ever to appear in the Armory boxing ring. He has been in the national fight picture for some time, and is ranked right along with the best.

The Frisco heavyweight stands 6'3" and weighs somewhere around the 218 mark, compared to Byrne, who stands 6'2", and will top the scales at around the same figure.

Joe Louis, the ex-World's Heavyweight Champion, had to go all but 15 seconds of the scheduled ten rounder to whip the big Californian in their bout a few years ago. Louis was awarded a technical knockout just as the bout was coming to a close.

When Rex Layne was making his bid for top honors in the fight game, Walker tamed him down by holding the highly regarded Layne to a draw.

Promoter Mack Lillard still doesn't have any definite schedule for his supporting card for Friday night's mainliner, but has several top notch boxers, who are just waiting to make an Armory appearance.

Ralph Weiser, The Beauty Bomber, is one of the fighters that Lillard has in mind, and Darrell Harrington, who is fresh from a win over Rudy Carlson in their last meeting, is another.

Sprague River's KO artist, Bobby Barney, will probably be on the card, if an opponent can be found for him.
