The love triangle slaying of Roy Durham, 48-year-old bank janitor, is a prospective case. Arthur F. Pigg, 73-year-old night club photographer, is held for the murder of Durham with a gun at the climax of an argument over the janitor's ex-wife, Eulah Durham, 44.

Whether the case goes to the grand jury depends on the outcome of a preliminary hearing slated for Friday before District Judge D.E. Van Vactor.
