Chicago Educator Holds Successful TV School

HOLLYWOOD (U)—Like many other American women, Frances Horwich is a schoolteacher. The only difference is that her class numbers 6½ million.

Dr. Horwich is the originator and sole proprietor of Ding Dong School, a Chicago TV show that delights and informs pre-school children from coast to coast every weekday.

"But we also have viewers from 7 months to 87," said Dr. Horwich, who visited here for a couple of speeches. "You'd be surprised how many artísticas watch the show for exercises in using the hands. Also a number of teachers' schools and hospitals watch regularly so future teachers and internes can learn how to deal with young children."

Among most children's TV shows, Ding Dong School stands out like a rose amid thistles. While other programs parade violence and clownish antics before the young viewers, Dr. Horwich entertains and instructs her audience with gentle games and knowledge.

Her efforts have earned her 29 different awards, among them Associated Press Woman of the Year in Education. "That pleased me very much," she reflected. "My friends in education had begun to think that I had lapsed into the entertainment field."

Dr. Horwich has taught kindergarten through third grades since 1929 and has acquired degrees from Chicago, Columbia and Northwestern (Ph.D.). As president of a national group for day nurseries, she was approached by NBC for advice on a program for children from 3 to 6.

Kidnap Case Goes To Jury

SAN FRANCISCO (U)—Six men and six women today deliberate the case of two former private detectives charged with kidnaping a San Francisco real estate broker.

If Harold Jackson, 52, and Joe Lear, 48, are found guilty, they face possible sentences of death or life imprisonment without possibility of parole.

The two former private investigators are charged with abducting Leonard Moskowitz last January.

Moskowitz was rescued 61 hours later by alert police who spotted a man making a post-midnight ransom call from a street-corner telephone booth. No ransom was paid. First \$500,000, then \$300,000 had been demanded. The telephone was Jackson, who led police to Moskowitz, who was guarded by Lear in a rented house.

Jackson's defense was that there was no kidnaping—that Moskowitz, 36, dreamed it all up as a hoax to extort money from his father.

Moskowitz testified he was hired by Lear as a private investigator, and that when he realized he was involved in a kidnaping he stayed with it in fear of his own life and those of his wife and stepson. The jury got the case yesterday afternoon and deliberated until nearly midnight.

Under California's Little Lindbergh Law, the lightest possible sentence upon conviction is life imprisonment without possibility of parole. Conviction of kidnaping with bodily harm could mean the death sentence.

NEW CHURCH
BERLIN (U)—The East German government has granted permission for the construction of a Protestant and a Catholic church in hitherto churchless Stalinstadt, steel city near the Oder River. Church authorities announced Thursday.

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
