ROSE CARE

For good summer rose blooms, the public information office of All-American Rose Selections offers a few suggestions.

"The best way to keep weeds at a minimum and condition the soil at the same time, is to lay down a heavy mulch before hot weather begins. A two-inch layer of peat moss, compost, well-rotted manure, straw or other material, will help to store moisture and to prevent baking of the surface soil.

Light surface cultivation will remove weeds and keep the soil friable, but deep penetration should be avoided. Roses produce a network of tiny hairlike roots just beneath the surface of the ground and they are easily damaged or destroyed by the over zealous gardener.

Because they produce a good deal of wood and so many flowers, roses make heavy demands on soil, and should be fed at regular intervals. There are many good all-purpose commercial fertilizers on the market, and organic fertilizer, if available, is excellent for roses. In general, four feedings per season will be sufficient.

First feeding—a heaping tablespoon of fertilizer, sprinkled around each plant, followed by thorough watering—should be applied just before the first blooming period, with two more at intervals of about a month. Feedings should stop by mid-August.

Refreshing Milk Drinks

From the Oregon Dairy Council's staff of home economists come a selection of refreshing, wholesome drinks with fluid milk as the base.

HONEYKIST COOLER

(Serves 6)
1-3 cup honey
2 cups orange juice
2 teaspoons grated orange rind
6 cups milk
1 pint vanilla ice cream
Blend honey with orange juice and grated rind. Add cold milk, stirring to blend. Top with vanilla ice cream and garnish with grated rind or slice of orange.

ORANGE FROSTED

(Serves 4)
1 cup orange juice, fresh or frozen
2 cups milk
1 pint orange sherbet or vanilla ice cream
Combine all ingredients and beat with hand or electric beater until well mixed and frothy. Serve with organic slice.

HAWAIIAN DELIGHT

(Serves 2)
2 ripe bananas
1 1/2 cups cold milk
1/2 cup pineapple juice
1 teaspoon sugar
Slice bananas into a bowl and mash with spoon or beat with electric mixer until smooth and creamy. Add milk, then pineapple juice and sugar. Beat until smooth. Serve in glasses with a slice of

banana and cube of pineapple on a toothpick.

CAFE AU LAIT

Equal amounts of hot coffee and hot milk, preferably each in a separate pitcher. Whipped cream is desired. Pour hot coffee and hot milk into a cup in equal amounts from the two pitchers at the same time. Top with whipped cream.

MEXICAN CHOCOLATE

(Serves 4)
4 cups milk, scalded
8 teaspoons cocoa
8 teaspoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1 teaspoon vanilla
Scald milk in double boiler. Mix together sugar, cocoa, salt and spices. Pour 1/2 cup of the milk

slowly over dry ingredients, stirring until smooth. Cook cocoa mixture over low heat five minutes, stirring. Add remaining hot milk and beat with a rotary egg beater until frothy and serve hot.

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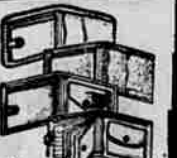
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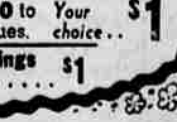
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
