Fewer Labor Laws Urged
 NEW YORK (AP) — Secretary of Labor Mitchell said Thursday too much emphasis on labor legislation is "a short-sighted and erroneous concept of labor-management relations"—that the important thing is to leave employers and workers free to settle their own problems.

Mitchell said in remarks prepared for a luncheon meeting of the New York Rotary Club that it is the Eisenhower administration policy to provide only a "framework" of national labor legislation allowing "the parties, with proper restriction, to engage freely in the give and take of collective bargaining."

The labor secretary did not refer to present debate in the Senate in Washington in which a number of proposals have been offered in addition to those recommended by President Eisenhower.

Mitchell did say the administration proposals are "sound, temperate, balanced and realistic," and that the administration is for less, not more, government intervention in labor disputes.

Singer Defends Army Service
 PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Singer Eddie Fisher, one of several entertainers and sports figures whose Army careers are being investigated by a House subcommittee, said he sought no special favors or assignments during his two years in service.

"I did everything in camp that every other guy in basic did," said Eddie at an alumni function at a Philadelphia high school which he once attended.

The House Armed Services subcommittee is looking into charges that some athletes and entertainers were coded while in the Army.

Fisher said he handled singing chores and entertained troops here and in Korea and Germany while in uniform. "I was ordered to," he added.

Activities Of Athletes Questioned
 WASHINGTON (AP) — House investigators called Friday for more information on the Army activities of Sandy Saddler after hearing that the featherweight boxing champion "double-crossed the government" about an application for furlough.

Also ticketed for scrutiny by a House armed services subcommittee in public session were allegations of Army "coddling" of Sugar Ray Robinson, former middleweight champ, and Willie Maye, New York Giants outfielder.

Brig. Gen. Herbert P. Powell, deputy director of Army personnel, said the Army was taking "full responsibility for any case of so-called pampering of athletes."

Rep. Rivers (D-SC), a subcommittee member, who raised the question of a "double-cross" by Saddler, said he got the impression that "if there was any coddling of anyone, it was coddling on the part of the Army."

Powell said that was right, and the subcommittee lodged no charges of any kind against Saddler. The boxing champ was invited to testify himself if he felt he had been "aggrieved" at the hearing.

Col. John S. Rosma, deputy commander of Ft. Jay, N.Y., told the investigators that when Saddler was discharged from the Army last month he gave the fighter a personal letter of commendation "for his efficient performance of duty as a soldier."

Under questioning by Rivers, Rosma acknowledged that "if I'd known he'd double-crossed the government, I wouldn't have done it." He added that from his personal observation Saddler had been "an outstanding soldier."

The alleged double-cross was brought out in testimony by Powell. The general said Saddler had signed up for a fight while on leave but that the fight was not scheduled to come off until six days after the leave had expired. He said Saddler then asked a 15-day extension of his furlough, claiming his wife was sick and needed him at home.

Unkind Driver Kills Dog
 Prompt response but of the wrong kind was made by at least one motorist to the appeal issued Thursday by Mrs. Annabelle Newton, secretary of Klamath County Humane Society, to motorists to slow down when they observe pets on highways.

Late Thursday afternoon, according to Mrs. L. E. Holzhauser, Route 1, Box 932A, a motorist ran down the family dog which was standing alongside the road.

"The car swung to the left side of the road, almost piling into the ditch, to deliberately hit the dog," she said, "but didn't kill it outright."

A passerby reported the accident to the Holzhausers, and the two little girls, aged 9 and 12, whose pet it was are very much broken hearted, according to their mother.

Mrs. Newton's appeal, made in the midst of Be Kind to Animal Week, urged that motorists keep a lookout for animals. "By slowing down just a little bit, an animal's life and someone's happiness may be saved," she said.
