FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—Americans could have built more than nine million homes with the lumber "wasted" on crates and shipping boxes during World War II, the American Ordnance Assn. was told yesterday.

Col. James N. Sammons, chief materials packaging and handling for the Air Research and Development Command, quoted a report that 80 per cent of the nation's lumber production in World War II was consumed in packaging, packing and shipping activities.
