

# Red Sox Back After One Week Layoff

## Redlegs Back In NL Lead

The Boston Red Sox could feel a little easier today about picking up their paychecks. They knew they were back working for a living.

When the Bostonians outlasted Washington 7-6 last night it marked their first victory in two weeks and their first official action of any kind since a week ago today. Bad weather has caused eight postponements in Boston so far.

The Red Sox took advantage of the occasion to celebrate. The victory lifted them out of the American League cellar over Baltimore into seventh place. They blasted three runs in the first inning, their first in nine days, and they scored more runs than in any previous game.

But one of the Red Sox' best reasons for feeling happier about life was the presence of Ted Williams on the Boston bench.

Sluggish, who broke his collarbone on the first day of spring training, is working himself into shape and will make the club's first western swing starting Tuesday in Chicago.

Williams isn't quite ready for action, but Manager Lou Boudreau said he expected him to see pinch hit action shortly.

Last night the Red Sox didn't use any pinch hitters. Sammy White's three-run homer in the third inning helped Boston into a 7-6 lead and the Senators just failed to catch up.

Rookie Truman Clevenger, making his first major league start, doled out one hit in the first five innings. Ellis Kinder bailed him out in the sixth after a pair of two-run homers by Jim Busby and Clyde Volmer. Roy Sievers hit another two-run homer off Kinder in the seventh.

**FIRST PLACE**  
Cincinnati took over first place from Philadelphia in the National League. The Redlegs swamped St. Louis 10-4 while the Phils were bowled out by Brooklyn 3-1. Chicago beat Milwaukee 3-0. The New York Giants were rained out at Pittsburgh.

In the only other American League action the New York Yankees won their second straight shutout, this one by Tom Morgan, as they best Philadelphia 2-0 on successive home runs in the seventh by Mickey Mandle and Yogi Berra.

The homers, and a double by Hank Bauer, were the only New York hits off Morrie Martin. The shutout was Morgan's second, both over the Athletics.

A three-run home run by Hobie Landrith capped a five-run spree for the Reds against Gerry Staley in the second inning at Cincinnati. In the seventh inning Landrith and Johnny Temple worked a double steal with Temple sweeping home for the third time this season.

The all-time record for thefts of home is seven by Pete Reiser of Brooklyn in 1941.

**WINNING STREAK**  
Don Newcombe called a halt to the Phillies' six-game winning streak. The Dodger right-hander struck out Bobby Morgan with two out and two on in the sixth and Johnny Lindell, batting for Morgan, with two out and again in on in the eighth. Seven walks by Curt Simmons made it easy for Brooklyn in the early innings.

Warren Hacker turned in the Chicago shutout in his first starting assignment of the season. He allowed five hits including three doubles. The Cubs scored their three runs on six singles off Bob Buhl in the first six innings.

Despite a game-time temperature of 39 degrees Milwaukee drew 24,037 paying customers, largest crowd of the day and night.

Baltimore, Detroit, Chicago and Cleveland weren't scheduled.

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## Paul Richards Can Win With Usher

### WIL To Tackle Problem

NEW YORK (NEA) — In 1951, when Paul Richards had an amazing collection of White Sox on top at the time of the All-Star Game, Billy Evans poked his head through the door of Red Rolfe's New York hotel room.

"The White Sox are winning another," said the then Detroit general manager to his field marshal, giving the score of the Chicago club's game in Washington.

"Who's pitching?" asked Manager Rolfe.

"Oh, what's the difference?" said Evans. "Richards probably picked up somebody on his way to the park. Or maybe he's using an usher."

It was the old umpire's way of saying that most anyone could pitch winning baseball for the able manager of the South Siders.

Richards is the current O'Clon's man of the majors and its foremost teacher, especially with pitchers.

"Out of the past came Don Johnson, former Yankee, to plague them with, for him, new pitching patterns," the report read.

"The Bombers had beaten Johnson seven times and he had not won from them since they traded him to the Browns in 1950.

"Old Don had tried to blow the ball by batters.

"The new Johnson showed a slider, a good curve, a better controlled fast ball and a let up."

Johnson yielded just five hits in seven and two-thirds innings in the White Sox' first 1954 appearance at Yankee Stadium to give them eight victories in the last nine starts.

Johnson, who kicked around with the Yankees and in their chain for four years, is one of Professor Richards' newest projects. He could be a pippin, for he's only 27.

"I learned more about pitching under Burt Grimes in Toronto last season and under Richards this spring than I did in my previous seven years in baseball," he says, simply.

Richards, the long-time catcher, specializes in getting mileage out of pitchers passed along by others. He got two good years out of Saul Rogovin, made the American League's earned-run leader. He made a star out of Billy Pierce, a crack relief worker of Harry Doherty.

Virgil Trucks engineered a tremendous comeback under his guidance, etc.

Bob Keegan, also a refugee from Yankee farms, has blossomed into a stout under Richards at 31. The boss contends that Keegan was the most formidable fliker in the league at the end of last season, when he bagged four out of five and the last three with an ERA of 1.32. He was won two games this spring, letting the Indians down with four hits.

Richards is bringing Jack Harshman, the converted left-handed first baseman who copped 23 for Nashville, along slowly, believes he'll win in the big show.

He sees Tom Flanagan, a towering, skinny southpaw who at 19 has had two years on the farms, as another Lefty Grove, even though Mickey McDermott of the White Sox beats the Cincinnati kid to that title. Flanagan can really fire the ball and has a curve to match.

Billy Pierce and Virgil Trucks are the only name pitchers with the White Sox, but the staff has an ERA of 2.75 for the early going.

The White Sox will do considerably better than all right—if Paul Richards doesn't get tired thinking.

The Northern Division baseball pennant chase Saturday appeared to be shaping up as a stretch run between the University of Oregon Ducks and Oregon State's hot and cold Beavers.

Both came through with victories Friday, the Ducks shading Washington State, 5-4, and the Beavers lowering the boom on Washington to the tune of 7-4.

Oregon still holds a slim lead in the race, with a 7-2 record compared to OSC's 9-3 mark. Washington is still in the picture, at 6-4, but Washington State (4-7) and Idaho (1-1) appear to be completely out of contention.

Oregon built up a 5-0 lead in the first five innings and then weathered a late Washington State surge to topple the Cougars. WSC broke loose for three runs in the eighth but couldn't get up enough steam to overtake the Ducks.

The Beavers, who dropped their Thursday game to the Huskies, bounced back Friday with a late rally to chalk up victory No. 9 of the current campaign.

Oregon State cracked a 4-4 tie with a singleton in the eighth and clinched the victory with two more runs in the top of the ninth.
