Potato Types Discussed

TULELAKE — Most of the important new potato varieties developed by the United States Department of Agriculture and other sources have been tried out at the Tulelake Field Station, reports B. J. Hoyle. In general, hundreds of varieties are tested before a good new spud is discovered. So far "special purpose" potato chips such as Kennebec for potato chips have been the most successful in finding a new market.

Kennebec has a very vigorous growth habit but is not a very high quality eating potato according to some growers who produced it here last year. However, the potato chippers will always buy Kennebec over any other variety when they can get it. The reason for this is that per hundred pounds of potatoes they get eight to ten per cent more pounds of finished chips.

Some question has been raised concerning the large amount of field greening noticed by some growers. This condition is due to a growth habit of the potatoes and can be overcome by careful cultivation and close attention to cultural practices.

Another variety grown at the field station is Houma. After years of testing different varieties this one shows the most promise as a possible substitute for White Rose, and this basin could become an important seed producing area for the central California market. Since changing varieties depend upon market acceptance of the new variety, many years may go by before Houma might become important.

Other varieties tested last year were; Cobbler, Katahdin, Sebago, Sequoia, Ontario and Menominee. Some of these have certain disease resistant characteristics. They all produce satisfactory yields but only Kennebec and Sebago produce higher dry matter than the Netted Gem.

Senator Says Report Unfair

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Bridges (R-NH) has termed unfair and ridiculous reports that he has blocked a new diplomatic post for John J. Muccio, who was U. S. ambassador to Korea during the fighting there.

"I'm not opposed to him and I'm not favoring him," Bridges told the Senate yesterday. He added: "If his name comes up now I'm going to scrutinize him very carefully."

Muccio, a veteran foreign service officer, now is heading U. S. negotiations with Panama on proposed revisions of the Canal Zone treaty.

Mayor Paul Landry has received a letter from Bartlett Boder, president of the St. Joseph, Missouri, Historical Society, requesting a picture of Toby Riddle, later called Winema, who attempted to save General Ganby's life in 1873.

Boder says there is a town called Linkville — which was the early name of Klamath Falls — in northern Missouri, and he wonders if a Missourian might have named this town.

The general belief, however, is that the town was named Linkville after Link River, and that was so named because of the link it forms between Lake Ewauna and Upper Klamath Lake.

George Nurse, who named the original town, is a native of New York, born in 1820, according to Rachel Applegate Good, author of "History of Klamath County."
