Seaway Bill Goes To Ike For Signing

WASHINGTON (AP)—The St. Lawrence Seaway, a notoriously slow legislative starter, wound up in a blaze of speed yesterday when the senate completed congressional action...

An Atlantic-to-the-Great Lakes passageway for ocean-going ships has been a project favored by every U. S. President since World War I...

This year the senate okayed the bill in January and the House, voting on it for the first time Thursday, approved a version with just minor differences...

Even as seaway proponents were congratulating each other on their victory, some voices were heard talking about expanding the 100-million dollar project later.

Sen. Douglas (D-Ill.) noted the measure does not provide for deepening the Detroit River so deep-draft boats can move into Lakes Huron, Michigan and Superior.

Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) declared the next step would be to extend the seaway "way up to Superior and Duluth, the twin harbors of Wisconsin and Minnesota."

The 108 million cost to this country is to be met through sale of bonds to the U. S. Treasury, which are to be repaid over an estimated 50-year period through tolls collected from the seaway's users.

Canada's cost is estimated at 200 million.

Students Hear Educator

Schools now make it possible for any youngster to make anything of himself that he really wants, was the summation of a talk by Dr. William Odell of Stanford University to honor students of Klamath County high schools Friday night.

Dr. Odell was the guest speaker at a banquet for the top scholars, the high school principals and their wives and the wives and mothers of Rotarians given at the Willard Hotel.

The Stanford educator characterized his talk as taking time to point out some of the obvious things about our school systems that we ordinarily don't pause to think about.

The object of education is to help make independent, self-managing, useful citizens of our youngsters, and the home, as it always has, still has the greatest influence in that way, Dr. Odell said.

There has been a vast improvement in education in the last generation, both in fundamentals like the "three R's" and in the fine arts and practical arts and in citizenship and other activities that develop leadership, he said.

Dulles Outlines Plans For Action In Southeast Asia

By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER WASHINGTON (AP)—The Eisenhower administration is considering defense commitments for Southeast Asia which "might involve the use of armed force" to block Communist conquest of that rich, strategic area.

But under "present conditions" the administration has no intention of sending American forces to fight in the war in Indochina, a "suitable basis" for such action is lacking.

These basic points of administration approach to the Indochina crisis were laid down by Secretary of State Dulles last night in a nationwide broadcast only hours after news of the fall of Dien Bien Phu reached the American capital.

Word that Communist besiegers had finally overrun the Indochina fortress brought calls from a number of U.S. leaders for new efforts toward united action against Red aggression in Southeast Asia.

President Eisenhower messaged Secretary of State Dulles that the administration should know "that no sacrifice of theirs has been in vain; that the free world will remain faithful to the causes for which they have so nobly fought."

Dulles, a Security Council member, used an informal "fireside chat" approach to his television and radio audience last night, making small changes in his prepared text as he went along but not altering the general tenor of his talk.

He expressed confidence that discussions now under way with 10 friendly nations — Britain and France among them on the defense of Southeast Asia will result in a free world coalition that will rock a Communist aggression there.

"This common defense may involve serious commitments by us all. But free people will never remain free unless they are willing to fight for their vital interests."

So far as the United States is concerned, Dulles said that entering into such commitment is possible only on two conditions: 1. Congressional approval would have to be given. Congress, he said, "is a full partner" with the administration in any such enterprise.

2. Other free nations would have to join the pledge and share the burden. In Dulles' words, there would have to be "an adequate collective effort based on genuine mutuality of purpose in defending vital interests."

Judge Killer Goes On Trial

WARREN, Pa. (AP)—Norman Moon, charged with murdering a judge in court, goes on trial Monday in the same courtroom in which the shooting occurred.

The 36-year-old Conneville, Pa., construction worker is accused of slaying Judge Allison D. Wade, in the Warren Court Courthouse last Jan. 13. He has pleaded innocent.

The state says the defendant killed the judge a few seconds after Moon had been called before the bench on charges of non-support of his wife.

In the confusion following the shooting, Moon left the courthouse, got into his auto and drove away with state policemen in pursuit.

About six miles down the highway, the officers brought Moon's auto to a halt by firing several shots. Moon then got out of the auto and shot himself in the throat before the officers could reach him. He subsequently recovered.
