

Pels Drop Doubleheader

Medford High's baseball team dealt the Klamath Union High School diamond team a pair of bitter losses Saturday afternoon on Wright Field by scores of 22-14 and 4-2.

The first game was a free swinging, free scoring affair in which 36 hits were chalked in the score books, 18 for each ball club.

Medford opened their first inning by scoring five times off Pel starting pitcher Dave D'Olivo, on five hits and three errors.

The Pels came back, and in their half of the initial inning, they pushed over six runs to take a temporary lead. Seven hits figured in the Pelican's six runs.

With Gene Metler and Bill Hamblin collecting doubles, Modesto Jiminez adding a triple, and Don Dexter batted out a three run home run to deep left-center field.

Both teams countered heavy in the last inning. Medford scored 11 runs on eight hits, two base on balls, and two Pelican errors.

Klamath rallied for eight runs, but fell short of the four run lead that the visitors held.

Medford's Dick Pepper led the Medford nine at the plate with three hits, including a four bagger and a double. Ron Conner top the Pel hitters with his three safeties in five tries at the plate.

In the second game, the pitcher seem to get back into the spirit of things, and held the clubs to 12 hits, seven of them going to Medford.

Klamath scored once in the second inning and one time more in the fourth, while Medford was picking up three runs in their part of the third, and then added one more in the last of the fifth, the final inning of the nightcap.

The Pels put Bill Hamblin's single together with Geard Hackley's double for their first run, and then Hackley singled with one away in the fourth, and came home on Bob Harshberger's single to end the home team's scoring.

Medford's three runs came on a single, a base on balls, a fielder's choice and an error, a triple by Terry Sherwood, and a double that scored Sherwood from third.

Sherwood paced the Medford nine with two hits in three trips to the plate. Besides his big triple, he also collected two for two on the Pelican's side of the fence.

He also had a perfect day at the plate in the first game getting two for two. Bob Harshberger batted out two hits in as many times in the first game also.

Tomorrow the Klamath nine travels to Ashland to meet the Grizzlies in a single afternoon game, and Saturday they journey to Yreka for another single contest that closes out the year for the baseball club.

Washington, WSC Win N.D. Meets

Darrell Skarvick and Denny Meyer paced Washington to a 98-33 win over Idaho at Seattle. Bob Gary set two meet records for WSC as the Cougars whipped Oregon State 89-41 1/2 at Pullman.

Skarvick set a broad jump record of 22 feet 4 1/2 inches, took first in the high jump and 220-yard dash, and a second in the javelin to net 18 points for the Huskies. His broad jump was 2 1/2 inches better than the meet record set last year by Bruce Sweeney of Idaho.

Meyer marked up a meet standard in the two-mile, finishing 25 yards ahead of Lou Gorley in the record time of 9:17.5. Gorley set the old mark of 9:27.4 on the same track two years ago.

Gary, a junior from Seattle, was clocked at 9.7 seconds in the 100 and 21.2 in the 220-yard dash, both meet records. Don Chamber of Oregon State tied the meet record of 24.1 seconds in the low hurdles. Chambers also won the high hurdles.

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Three years after practically everybody had accepted Nellie Fox as quite a second baseman, Paul Richards said he couldn't make the double play well enough to beat the Yankees.

It seems that Nellie Fox had a little trouble going to the bag with the wrong foot. It was costing him a step in making the pivot.

As recently as this spring, Manager Richards considered switching little Fox to third base.

But Fox's fault has been eliminated, which is one of the principal reasons why the Chicago Americans have been bitten by the pennant bug.

Marty Marion is credited with Fox's improvement in the very important department of the double killing and knocking the other side out of a big inning.

When St. Louis Cardinals' Arthur Ehlers the truth about the Orioles and began being paid \$35,000 for not managing him, Richards had his man.

No one ever made the double play better than the long-time Mr. Shortstop.

A rap against Don Johnson, in addition to the fact that his pitching was confined to attempting to blow his last ball by hitters, was that he wasn't too accomplished as a fielder.

With the Southern Siders, the big Oregonian has a better controlled hard one, an excellent curve, a slider, a knuckler and a change of pace.

Practice has made him a fifth infielder.

Grissom Could Be N L Sleeper

NEW YORK — (NEA) — Blanketing the Phillies with three hits the other afternoon, Marvin Edward Grissom gave unmistakable evidence that he is to be a Giant sleeper.

Marv Grissom had a kind of easy season last year; not too much work, and his arm is strong again. The big right-hander can really throw, and is a very earnest, determined fellow.

A pitcher developing a new pitch requires someone to practice on, and Grissom last fall used the Japanese for the purpose of developing a screwball. In a relief stint this spring, he handcuffed Duke Snider and the Dodgers with it.

Obtained from the Red Sox on waivers last mid-summer, Grissom stopped the Phillies cold for six innings as a fireman, then fired. That gave Lippy Leo Durocher the impression that the 36-year-old was strictly a relief worker with a limit of five or six rounds. But when he breezed by the Phillies for his first start this year, the Polo Grounders had an added starter.

You now wonder why Grissom was waived out of the American League. The Giants took him because, with Sal Maglie and Larry Jansen ailing, they were desperately in need of someone who could get the ball over the plate with something on it.

American Leaguers undoubtedly suspected that Grissom had a sore arm. He has a lame arm history.

Grissom has been a funny kind of a pitcher. He had only one grand slam home run in Triple A, where he lingered for five campaigns, turning in 20 victories for the Seattle Coasters in 1951. He did not break into organized baseball until he was 23, and got in only one season before being taken by the military for four years.

When Grissom had it, however, he beat the tough clubs — in the minors and the majors. With the White Sox in 1952, he was one of the mighty few pitchers who consistently bothered the Yankees.

Grissom gives the Giants a second elder statesman, the other one being of course, Sal Maglie, who is 37. If Maglie keeps going and Larry Jansen comes around, the Giants are going to be exceedingly rough, for in Johnny Antonelli they acquired another "big" pitcher.
