4-H Leaders Association Members Guests Of County Organization Here Monday

Forty-one representatives from 4-H Club leaders associations in Lake, Josephine, Crook, Jackson and Deschutes counties were guests of the Klamath County 4-H Leaders Association Monday evening.

The guests were invited as an outgrowth of a plan of visitation, in which counties would issue invitations to neighboring county associations to attend at least one meeting. The suggestion was made at the state board meeting held in Grants Pass last February.

Visitors included Lee Hensen, Lakeview, Lake County 4-H Club agent, and his wife and three leaders; Barbara Watt, Josephine County 4-H Club agent, and 10 leaders from the Grants Pass area; Kenneth Waud, Prineville, Crook County 4-H Club agent and three leaders.

Glenn Klein, Medford, Jackson County 4-H Club agent and 14 leaders; Mrs. Leslie Kribs, Bend, with five other leaders from Deschutes County.

The leaders represented a 11 phases of 4-H Club work — cooking, sewing, livestock, forestry, etc.

Guest speaker for the evening was Eugene Favell, Klamath Falls merchant, whose hobby is arrowhead collecting. Favell discussed arrowhead collecting — the why and how; told of the three distinct civilizations of Indians in Oregon, the cave Indians 10,000

years ago, the Indians of 1,500 years ago and the more recent, 200 to 300 years ago.

He showed slides taken on arrowhead hunting trips and of items in his collection of 5,000 and exhibited several trays of arrowheads.

Favell is a member of the Oregon Archeological Society. In his five years of hunting, he has picked up all types and sizes, most of them in Southern Oregon; a few in the Columbia River region.

Also on the agenda for the meeting were demonstrations by two champion teams in the recent Spring Fair — Peggy Carson and Katherine Moore, Merrill, demonstrating flower arranging; Nancie Rayson and Chandelie Horley, Midland, crepe paper cord.

Her report included the club projects covered, the style show and talent night, since Klamath is one of the few counties which still has a Spring Fair. The local event included approximately 300 exhibits, according to Mrs. Wolfrum.

Strawberry Crop Nipped By Frost

PORTLAND — More than one-fourth of Oregon's expected strawberry crop was ruined by last month's heavy frosts, the Federal Crop Reporting Service said Monday.

The crop now is estimated at 1,300,000 crates of 36 pounds each. That is a drop of 26 per cent from last year's harvest of 1,827,000 crates.

Washington's crop was less seriously damaged. A crop of 1,784,000 crates, 5 per cent less than last year, is expected there. Severe damage to fruit trees was reported in several sections from the Skagit County 4-H Leaders Association to attend their leaders meeting June 18 at Yreka.
