Indian 4-H Boys To Visit America

NEW YORK (AP)—The national 4-H Club Foundation Monday brought 25 young farmers from India and nine from Pakistan into the country to study American methods.

The group arrived on the American export liner Constitution and will disperse into 12 states after a visit to Washington.

They will spend six months on U. S. farms. Their ages range from 21 to 30.

Ten young American farmers are scheduled to go to India in August and five to Pakistan in reciprocation.

River Forecasters Fear Kootenai River Floods In Spring; Other Areas Eyed

PORTLAND (AP)—River forecasters warned the Kootenai River area of Northwest Montana, Northern Idaho and Canada Monday of the possibility of serious flooding this spring.

Areas along the east slope of the Cascade Basin and the lower reaches of the Columbia River also were told floods may strike when the runoff of mountain snow increases.

A joint forecast by the Weather Bureau and the Soil Conservation Service, based on snow surveys made May 1, said the runoff in the Kootenai appeared likely to be the greatest on record. The snow pack is the biggest yet.

Kootenai at Bonners Ferry, Idaho, can be expected to reach a flood level of 35 1/2 feet, the forecasters said.

Downstream, the Columbia can be expected to rise to 35 1/2 feet at Trinidad, Wash., and somewhere between 25 1/2 and 27 1/2 feet in the Portland-Vancouver, Wash., area. Flood stage is 15 feet at Vancouver, 18 feet at Portland, but normally little damage results below 24 feet.

The forecasters, Anthony J. Poles of the Weather Bureau's river forecast center and Morlan W. Nelson of the Soil Conservation Service, noted that cool weather has delayed the usual early runoff. Some snow courses even added to their water content in the past month—an unusual occurrence.

All this increases the possibilities of floods, the forecasters said, but added many areas might escape flooding if the weather acts right. Alternate periods of warm weather, melting the mountain snows, then cool weather could allow the streams to carry off the water without serious flooding.

The next four to six weeks will tell the story.

Because of the flood potential, the forecasters said further snow survey measurements will be taken May 15 and June 1 this year. In addition, daily forecasts on river stages will be made by Weather Bureau river offices at Portland, Spokane and Boise.

Nearly all the rivers covered in the survey are expected to have above normal runoff in the next five months. These include:

Columbia River at Grand Coulee, 125 per cent of normal; at The Dalles, 127; Kootenai River at Leona, Mont., 133; Clark Fork above Missoula 105, above Cabinet Gorge, Idaho, 121; Flathead River near Polson, 130; Spokane River at Post Falls, Idaho, 128; Okanogan River near Tonasket, Wash., 140; Methow River at Twisp, 138; Chelan River at Chelan, 135; Wenatchee River at Peshastin, 137; Snake

River at Weiser, Idaho, 100; Boise River above diversion 106; South Fork Boise River at Anderson Ranch Dam, 119; Malheur River near Drewsey, 64; North Fork of Malheur at Beulah 68, Payette River near Horseshoe Bend, Idaho, 108; Weiser River 117; Salmon River 103; Clearwater River 117.



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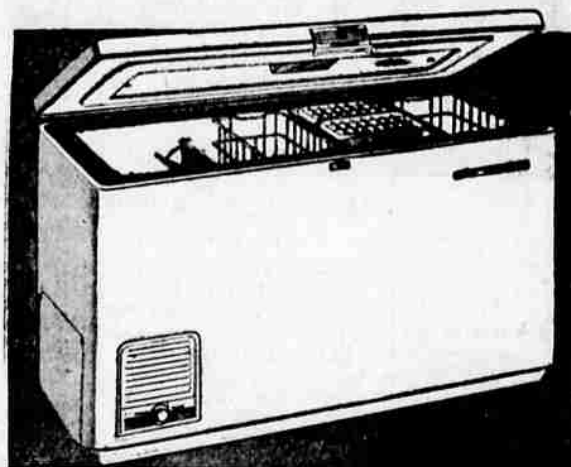
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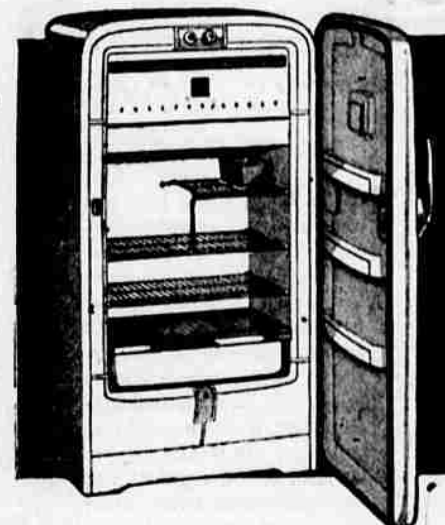
