Ullman Speaks Out For Public Power In Oregon

"The only formula for new pay-rolls and industry in the Pacific Northwest, is abundant cheap power from our river resources," according to Albert Ullman, realtor and builder, Baker, who spoke Saturday afternoon before the Pomona Grange at Bonanza.

Ullman is the Democratic candidate for the U.S. Congress from district No. 2 and has been the leader in the fight for a high federal-built dam at Hell's Canyon. Ullman in his talk, highlighted the high cost power formula now being worked out "under the guise of partnership." He said in part, "The development of our vast phosphate deposits into cheaper super-phosphate fertilizers, the processing of our mineral and chemical deposits, the continuation of light metals expansion here, are all solely dependent on large blocks of cheap power, available only under a sound and integrated Federal development plan."

Other topics of interest discussed by members of the grange, among them were weed control, by Charles A. Henderson, Klamath County agent and grange agricultural chairman, who spoke on the rapid growth of Mediterranean Sage, prevalent in the Bly district, and the common Morning Glory which is becoming a problem in suburban areas. Roscoe Roberts, steward of the Oregon State Grange, a dairymen from Medford; Bill Awl, Medford, and Wilbur Haskins, Merrill, manager and assistant manager of the Grade A Milk Producers Association, spoke on promotion of dairy products, outlining a program in which has proven satisfactory in Jackson County. The program includes promoting the serving of milk with meals in restaurants at no extra charge.

Grange will be held August 14 at Midland with Henley grange assisting. More than 100 persons attended the meeting Saturday.
