

# Spring Dog Sanction Meet Slated For Fairgrounds On May 16 For Purebred Dogs

Doors will open at the exhibit building at Klamath County Fairgrounds at 10 a. m. Sunday, May 16, for the Spring Dog Sanction Match and Obedience Trials, sponsored by Klamath Dog Fanciers, Inc.

Application blanks for entering any pure bred dog or puppy registered with the American Kennel Club will be available at the door. Judging starts at 11 a. m.

This show will not be as extensive or as formal as the big show in September and no championship points will be awarded. However, trophies and ribbons will be given for the following groups:

Puppies over six months and not exceeding one year of age, handled by an adult. Best of group, which is divided into six variety groups: sporting dogs, hound breeds, working dogs, terriers, toys and non-sporting dogs.

Special awards will be given to the boy and girl between the ages of 6 and 10, inclusive, and to the boy and girl between 11 and 16, inclusive, judged the best in junior showmanship and handling of a dog. This special event will start promptly at 3 p. m.

Awards will be given for best of breed and best of group. The six best of group winners compete for the top award.

A popular feature of the show will be the obedience trials. In these trials, dogs of all breeds will be judged on how well they carry out a prescribed set of exercises.

Approximately 100 dogs from the Klamath Basin, Medford, Grants Pass and Northern California towns are expected for the show.

## Milk Price Cuts Slated For June

PORTLAND — Milk price cuts, ranging from a half cent to 1 1/2 cents, for nearly all upstate markets were approved Monday by the State Board of Agriculture. The new price order is to go into effect June 1. Some time ago the board approved a half-cent decrease to go into effect May 16 for Portland, the northern Willamette Valley and Mid-Columbia regions. The price reductions will come out of cuts in producer prices
