IRIS SHOW
Plans are under way for the Iris show to be given at the Allamont School this spring. Due to warm weather there is a possibility that the show date will be earlier than anticipated. Women of the community are urged to participate and to enter flower displays. Exhibitors do not need to be affiliated with any garden club to enter exhibits, and floral arrangements. Interesting lectures in preparation for the show were given at the last meeting of the Evergreen Garden Club by Mrs. R. J. Miller

and Mrs. Charles Thurman. Their topic was "Flower Arranging and Different Types of Flower Containers." They brought out that flowers must be picked the day before exhibiting and left in deep water over night in a cool dark place to condition them for showing. Containers must be furnished by the exhibitor and the arrangements should be made before arrival at the show. However, a place will be provided at the school where arrangements can be made if necessary.

In choosing containers, the exhibitor should remember that dark colors have visual weight. Select containers with graceful lines and not too heavy a glaze. Baskets and pewter containers are usually identified with modern homes and take a bulkier, heavier type flower. Silver and glass are preferred for daintier blossoms.

Exhibitors should keep arrangements well balanced and flowers should be picked in different stages of development. While picking flowers for display, design and arrangement should be considered. Colors should be grouped for effectiveness. Anyone interested in arranging flowers may enter. It is only by experimenting that proficiency is gained. Classifications and entry rules will be published later.

Malin OK's City Budget For 54-55

MALIN — At the May meeting of the Malin City Council held Monday evening, in the Fire Hall, the 1954-55 budget was drawn up and approved. Meeting with the council was the budget committee consisting of Ed McCulley, Marvin Ebel, Joe Halsey, Mervyn Wilde, Floyd Harmon, Ben Pickett and city treasurer, Vatz Kalina. City official salaries approved were, city marshal, \$300.00 yearly; attorney, \$400.00 yearly; maintenance supervisor, \$600.00 yearly.

Due to the resignation of Tom Laird as mayor, the council meeting was conducted by council president, Louis Kalina. A dust coat of oil for newly graded streets, 4th and 5th and Lakeview Avenue and Malin, was approved. The eight blocks of streets will receive the coating of oil soon. A new and more adequate sewer pump has been ordered. The pump will run with electricity, or gas in case of a power shortage, and will be installed above ground. Citizens appeared before the council and asked to have a deep borrow pit covered or a culvert installed where there is a driveway and the removal of a house on Fifth Street, giving the next door neighbor adequate space to remodel. The council voted to send a committee to both places and make an investigation before acting. Also voted upon and approved by the council, was the bid on the installation of the new fire alarm system. The new system will provide five alarms instead of three, as in the past. They will be installed at the Kalina Store corner, at Saunders Garage, at the home of fire chief, John Hershfeld, at the fire hall and on the corner across the street from the high school.

Councilmen present were Bill Saunders, Louis Kalina, Enoch Petrasak, John Reber, Paul McCulley and Leonard Petrik, who was sworn in to fill the vacancy.

Her selection for the two-way exchange of rural youths was announced by Mrs. Winnifred Gillen, state 4-H extension agent heading the IPYE program in Oregon. The state's other delegate this summer is Dorothy Teel, of Hillsboro, who will go to Germany.

Miss Larson, a junior in home economics at Oregon State College, is the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Carl A. Larson of Hermiston. She lives on the 400-acre Umatilla field station, where her father is superintendent.

While living in Newell, S.D., she became a 4-H club member and continued club work after moving to Hermiston in 1945. In eight years of membership, she completed 18 projects — six in cooking, four in clothing, two in knitting, four in homemaking and two in rose and flower and home beautification.
