"Love of flowers is virtually instinctive in human beings and with this affection is the desire to arrange and display, dress the home with beauty and fragrance," said Mrs. Robert Smith, OTI speaker on "Color," at the district meeting of the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs at Malin, May 5.

"Self expression is the prime purpose of the flower arranger. Nature envelops us in a world of color; man surrounds himself with it as a natural impulse, but yet to the average man and woman, color has remained something of a mystery, an expression of nature taken for granted but not fully understood.

"We have all seen the young child's quick response to bright colors; his small hands go out to claim the brightest toy, the bright reds and yellows that seem to give him the utmost of pleasure. So it is with adults. Color is a pleasurable stimulant that may not be fully understood but it stimulates most people. It has the power to produce gaiety or excitement or to calm and quiet the individual and give a feeling of peacefulness.

The student of physics speaks of color in terms of light rays and wave lengths; the psychologist in terms of color sensation, while the artist considers color in terms of pigment. In practice light rays cannot be used. Pigments are colors produced by chemicals gathered from a great variety of sources. These pigments are used in stains, paints, dyes and glasses that are applied to surfaces in liquid form to produce a desired effect.

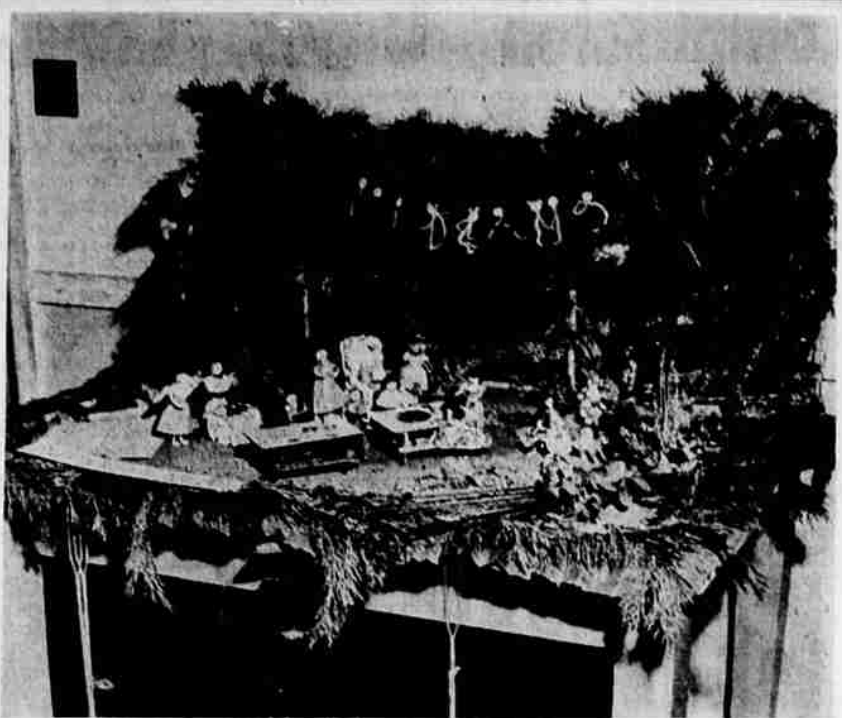
"Because the artist depends on pigments and not on light rays, the primary colors, red, yellow and blue must be accepted. From these three primary colors come all other colors in nature," Mrs. Smith said.

The tour will start from the forest ranger's office in Bly at 10 a.m. Sunday, May 16. A pot-

Stockmen are becoming alarmed at the rapid spread of the sage, found in this county for the first time about five years ago, according to Petersen.

The weed, which is expected to be placed on the noxious list, has gained considerable headway in Lake county where it is reported an estimated 1000,000 acres have become infested in recent years.

Anyone interested in making the tour should be at the Bly ranger station at 10 a.m. Sunday.
